This burial place is thought to be anterior to the Norse invasion, about the Eighth or Ninth century.

Didn't Deserve a Wife.

That laborious and industrious antiquary, Sir Charles Dugdale, who died on Feb. 10, 1686, at the age of 86 years, has preserved an amusing account of the funeral of the wife of a gentleman of means but cynical temper during the time of Oliver Cromwell. His name was Fisher Dilke, registrar of Shustoke, whose wife was a sister of Sir Peter Wentworth, one of the judges who condemned Charles I to death. Dilke first stripped his barn wall to make her a coffin; then bargained with the clerk for a great to make a grave in the churchyard, to save eighting by one in the church. This done, he speaketh about eight of his neighbors to meet at his house for bidders, for whom he provided three twopenny cakes and a bottle of claret. (This treat would cost two shillings at the utmost.) And some being come, he read a chapter in Job to them till all were ready, when, having distributed the cake and wine among them, they took up the corpse, he following them to the grave. Then putting himself in the parson's place (none being there), the corpse being laid in the grave and the spade of mold being cast thereon, he said: "Ashes to ashes, dust to dust," adding, "Lord, now I rest thou thy servant depart in peace, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation."—Philadelphia Times.

Round Shoulders.

A stooping figure and a halting gait, accompanied by the unavoidable weakness of lungs incidental to a narrow chest, may be entirely cured by the very simple and easily performed exercise of raising one's self upon the toes leisurely in a perpendicular several times daily. To take this exercise properly one must take a perfect position, with the heels together and the toes at an angle of 45 degrees. Then drop the arms lifelessly by the sides, animating and raising the chest to its full capacity muscularly, the chin well drawn in and the crown of the head flexed, as our professor used to put it, as if attached to a string suspended from the ceiling above. Slowly raise upon the balls of both feet to the greatest possible height, thereby exercising all the muscles of the legs and body; come again into the standing position without swaying the body backward out of the perfect line. Repeat this same exercise, first on one foot then on the other. It is wonderful what a straightening out power this exercise has upon round shoulders and crooked backs, and one will be surprised to note how soon the lungs begin to show the effect of such expansive development.—Hall's Journal of Health.

Friendship in Cookery.

What could possibly be less closely associated than cranberries in a swamp and turkeys in a farm yard? Yet a roast turkey ever quite perfect without cranberry sauce! Pigs and apples may be supposed to be related, for a pig in an orchard is the very creature to destroy more fruit than a cyclone, yet is roast pig ever supremely delicious without apple sauce? Do reasoning beings ever eat roast beef without a longing for mashed potatoes? It is possible, but it is improbable. There is a natural friendship between the two articles. Precisely why quails should go with toast, or truffles and mushrooms with cream, I cannot say, only it is nature, and that is enough. There are three prominent berries, yea four, and you must know their affinities to truly enjoy them. All the world knows that strawberries should go with cream; that red raspberries should be found in shortcake; that black raspberries should be eaten in bread and milk, and that blackberries are never quite themselves outside of pies and puddings. Codfish is disreputable alone, but a ball of codfish and potato would tempt a saint to break a fast and lose his soul.—Mary E. Spencer in Globe-Democrat.

Ammonia as a Cleanser.

Ammonia is a favorite substance for cleaning clothing. The ammonia should be well diluted with water—fifteen drops are enough in a small basin of water. A piece of flannel is saturated with this dilution and rubbed on the greasy spot until it is removed; after which that place on the cloth is sponged off with clear water. Dry somewhat and iron when damp. Ammonia water is also recommended to remove the shiny look from a black coat, but it is not good for much for this purpose. Strong black coffee, to which have been added a few drops of ammonia, is said to be good for cleansing a black coat that needs a thorough renovating.—Good Housekeeping.

The Greyhound.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.

The Fountain and Source of Much Physical and Mental Disturbance.

If you want a good appetite, don't worry. If you want things to go right in your homes or your business, don't worry. Women find a sea of trouble in their housekeeping. Some one says they often put as much worry and anxiety into a loaf of bread, a pie or a cake, into the weekly washing and ironing, as should suffice for much weightier matters; and this assertion, again, is quoted as a reason for the angularity of American women. Nervousness, which may be called the reservoir of worrying—its fountain and source—has come to be popularly considered the bane of the American race.

It is not confined to the women, by any means, but extends to the men as well. What good does fretting do? It only increases with indulgence, like anger, appetite, love, or any other human impulse. It deranges one's temper, excites unpleasant feelings toward everybody and confuses the mind. It affects the whole person, unites one for the proper completion of the work whose trifling interruption or disturbance started the fretful fit. Suppose these things go wrong today, the to-morrows are coming, in which to try again, and the thing is not worth clouding your own spirit and those around you, injuring yourself and them physically—for the mind affects the body—and for such a trifle. Suppose somebody makes a mistake, suppose you are crossed, or a trifling accident occurs; to fly into a fretful mood will not mend, but help to hinder the attainment of what you wish.

How to Keep a Rose Leaf Complexion.

A young woman with "a complexion like a rose petal," tells how she keeps it so: "In the first place I believe in plenty of fresh air and exercise, and unless prevented by some very important engagement I take a long walk every day. It is my opinion, based on extensive and careful observation, that ladies starve their complexions to death. The skin is furnished, the pores clogged and capillary action suspended from too much indoor life. I think every woman who values a good complexion should perform some manual labor or take some such exercise as is certain to stimulate perspiration. Just now I find it an excellent practice to go out doors, with no car fare and no wrap, to fill an engagement or deliver a message.

In order to keep from taking cold I am obliged to quicken my walk, and in going a distance of three blocks only I can get up a healthy perspiration and a glowing color. My favorite tramp is a twenty block stretch, which makes me rosy but not tired. When I get home I have a rub-down with a coarse towel, and after I eat something I feel like a top. If I can follow a long walk with my dinner and then tumble into a hammock for a thirty minute nap I look my very best, but unfortunately for my looks this plan is not always practicable. As a rule hot and cold water ruin the skin. I think a complexion is like satin—not to be laundered. As everybody must grow the plant experience for herself, so every lady must study her glass and find by trial what soaps and creams and what temperatures of water are most likely to enhance her beauty.

The Germ Theory.

"What proof have we of the modern theory that the cause of contagious disease lies in a living germ?"

For the satisfaction of people in general, to whom this question may very naturally occur, a physician gives the following explanation: "We employ to detect the germ the most positive sense with which we are endowed. With the aid of the microscope we see it. In the tissues, in the blood, in the excreta—in one or all of these—of a person suffering from a contagious disease are found certain foreign elements, which are included under the general term of bacteria. These, under the microscope, are seen to be living organisms, whose growth and multiplication may be observed.

In order to prove that these organisms are the cause of the disease, it is necessary to prove, first, that in a given disease they are always present; second, that, isolated from the media in which they are found in the body, they are still capable of initiating the morbid process characteristic of their species. These points, in the case of many diseases, have been established conclusively and indisputably, and, while the cumulative relation of other germs still lacks complete confirmation.

A Rotary Icicle.

I must tell you of a curious icicle that formed recently out in the far west. The superintendent of a large smelter in Colorado says in a recent letter to me: "It was the most curious affair I ever saw. Between the engine room and the blower room are numerous electric light wires and a small steam pipe with a coupling joint, from which a small jet of steam is escaping. The steam condensed and froze on to one of the wires, and soon an icicle hung down. The wire twisted so that the icicle took a turn and another point formed; soon another and then the affair broke loose at the point where the wire went through, and a perfect pinwheel was formed. It kept very slowly turning as the ice grew heavier on the side towards the jet of steam. It was probably a foot in diameter, or even more, nowhere more than three inches through and remarkably symmetrical, the curves of the spiral being quite regular."—Philadelphia Times.

A Practical Fire Extinguisher.

A physician says that he had studied the subject very carefully and was convinced that it would be well for every house to keep its own fire extinguisher, and it could be easily done. It would certainly be invaluable to persons living in the country, and far removed even from neighbors. The doctor then told me that he would give me the exact recipe now used in the fire extinguishers being offered for sale. Take twenty pounds of common salt and ten pounds of sal ammoniac (muriate of ammonia, to be had at any druggist) and dissolve in seven gallons of water. When dissolved it can be bottled and kept in each room of the house, to be used in an emergency. In case of a fire occurring one or two bottles should be immediately thrown with force into the burning place so as to break them, and the fire will certainly be extinguished.—New York Telegram.
