TWO QUEER CASES.

Differences Between a Chicago and a New York Scandal.

DETAILS OF THE NEW YORK CASE.

Police Captain Grant Won the Affections of Another Man's Wife—The Delicacy of the Chicago Case—In New York These Things Are Different.

There is a constant rivalry between the two metropolises of the east and of the west, New York and Chicago, to outdo each other in sensations. In rapidity of settling divorce cases Chicago is supposed to have the advantage; but a case has recently come up in each city which, instead of illustrating the quickness with which divorces are rushed through, illustrate the "law's delay," and in New York, if not "the insolence of office," at least the assurance of an officer. Police Capt. Donald Grant won and won the affections of a lady about whom there was but one drawback. She was the wife of another man, Mr. Jacob H. Van Zandt. Later, however, Van Zandt backed squarely out because it was naughty. He then set a value of \$10,000 on Mrs. Van Zandt's affections and commenced suit therefor. This has spoiled an affair which was moving on smoothly until Mr. Van Zandt became a victim of conscience. Van Zandt is married to a woman who loves another man. The other man is supposed to be providing for her maintenance. The trio are unhappy, and all because nobody is willing to transgress to satisfy the law.

And now comes Chicago with a case which, in point of delicacy, is a far more delectable morsel than the New York complication. There is one thing worse than that of Van Zandt or the captain in having "no one to love, none to care," and that is having two persons for this delicious purpose. Such is the position that Mr. Sharon, of Chicago, found himself in one morning recently upon taking up a paper a few days after marriage, and seeing that a decree of divorce he thought had been obtained had not been entered.

Mr. Sharon has a fancy for brief courtships, and avails himself of a woman's privilege in changing his mind rather suddenly. He had become involved with Miss Eva May Smith, whose affections seem to have been fixed upon him, but switched off and married her sister Florence.
