COVERED THEM UP.

Mr. Mercier has placed the conservatives in an uncomfortable position so far as the Jesuit estates bill is concerned. They tried to excuse the federal government and relieve it of the responsibility of sanctioning the act by saying that it was a provincial question one with the details or effects of which they had nothing to do. They went further and insinuated that Mr. Mercier was pleasing the Jesuits in order to secure their influence and also the continuance in power of his party in Quebec. Towards Mr. Mercier they wanted all the anti-Jesuit indignation to be directed, and they hoped he would be well punished because he was a very bad man. And now Mr. Mercier comes out, and, in a speech delivered at Coaticook,

"I may say that nearly every year the Catholics asked for these estates for school purposes. What do I find in 1876? A formal promise of the government of the time to settle this question. The promise is registered in Rome, the promise is registered here (in Quebec), and when I came into power I was placed face to face with the difficulty, and in such a position that I had either to fulfil the promise of my predecessors or forfeit it. I thought that honour was the best policy, and that even upon such a delicate question I was obliged to effect a settlement in order to extricate the province from so great a difficulty."

And so Mr. Mercier was simply redeeming the pledges of his predecessors? And who were his predecessors? The tories, the men who now want the Protestants against the Jesuit bill to go in pursuit of Mr. Mercier and to hound him out of office. They have got the wrong man in the premier of Quebec to trifle with.

#### ESSAYING A SCARE.

Mr. Meredith is again becoming brave. In the discussion of the school question he declared that the separate school should be brought under the control of the education department, and that its text books should be subject to approval as the books of the public school are. He is reported to have added that "he supposed his remarks would be used to injure him politically, but he felt bound to take the stand he was doing." The remark recal's the exploits of the man some time previous to the last general election. The Mail had entered upon its anti popery crusade before this, and paved the way for the storming of the government's citadel upon a supposed weak point. Mr. Meredith watched the drift of events for some time, and when dissolution occurred made a speech which seemed to indicate that he was willing to profit by the agitation of the Mail. But in the eleventh hour he changed his tactics, repudiated the Mail, and abandoned the cause which it espoused and with which he seemed to sympathise. A political Sedan followed, and the Mail had to shoulder the responsibility of it. Since then Mr. Meredith has been pursuing a mild and non committal policy; now he is getting brave again, gives evidence that he is going to at once mount the Protestant horse, says there is no doubt he will suffer by it, but that he is going to have the courage of his convictions. It is to be hoped so. It is about time he had some backbone. Heretofore he has been, it is alleged, under the influence and lirection of the leaders in dominion politics, and there is no proof yet that he has dissolved that unfortunate partnership. If he has decided to be his own master he may do something startling in provincial politics; if he has not his present talk will have the effect of fire cracker ex plosion; it will scare no one, damage no political wires, and leave intact the machinery by which he and his party following may be pulled into line at the proper time. Mr. Meredith's alarms are not seriously regarded. He has bared his strong right arm several times, and threatened to deal some one a deadly blow, and somehow or other it

has never yet been dealt.

That was a peculiar circular which the tory members of the federal parliament issued to the party of Ontario anent the preparation of the provincial lists. It is the more notable as following the announcement that the grits were active, were up to something, and needed watching. Here is the famous document in full. Every line of it is suggestive and interesting :

> "(CONFIDENTIAL) "HOUSE OF COMMONS,

"OTTAWA, March 4th, 1889. "Dear Sir, -At a meeting of the liberal conservative union, held on the 28th day of February in the tower room, parliament buildings, Ottawa, it was decided that strenuous efforts should be put forth in avery riding in Ontario to have the assessment rolls thoroughly looked after.

"It is an a sured fact that if our friends will look after this matter the defeat of the Mowat government at the next election will he a foregone conclusion. Assessors who are friendly to us should be privately instructed to see that the name of every one of our friends appears on this roll, and those | ine too often offered.

assessors who are not with us should be watched carefully.

"Manhood suffrage brings in a large number of new voters, and I would impress uponyou the importance of seeing that the name of every one of our friends in your polling sub division be placed on the assessment

"Remember the Ontario elections will shortly spring upon us, and the voters' list now being prepared will be the one used, and if you get a name once on the roll it is a very difficult and expensive matter to get

"All instructions, affidavits, etc., will be furnished you on application to the secretary of the liberal conservative union, Toronto. Be sure and have this matter attended to in your polling sub-division without fail."

First the cry was, "Watch the Grits!" Now it is "Watch the Assessors!" The party, it would seem, attaches no importance to the oath each assessor takes at the time of his appointment, and to the effect that he will perform his duty to the best of his ability and without fear, favour, or affection. Is this oath not to be respected in the case of the conservative officials? Are they to be privately instructed, regardless of that oath, as to the manner in which they can best serve the party with which they are identified? It would appear so. And those assessors who are not politically friendly, who are not susceptible to tory persuasion, who are bound to give evidence in their work of that conscientious uprightness with which they are credited, are to be watched. That is to be a liberal is to be under condemnation whether one is guilty or innocent of offence.

The reference in the circular to manhood suffrage, as secured by the legislation of the local house, is remarkable. It is amazing that the dominion government should be anxious about the registering of the votes of the young men -the conservative young men of course-and yet be not at all anxious to extend the franchise to these same persons in federal elections. Are the young men not to be trusted? Well, that is the impression The instructions are that only the right sort politically are to be looked after by the conservative agents, but the liberals will, no doubt, see to it that no unjust discriminations are made. In Kingston the assessor will brook no interference from any one, and if the assessors in the county permit themselves to be meddled with by the politicians they will commit a mistake for which there can be no apology.

Finally, that the instructions to the agents and servants of the tory party re the Ontario elections are issued from Ottawa is significant. It indicates a lack of confidence in Mr. Meredith for which there is no accounting. In several elections the oppositon in Ontario have been burdened by the acts of the Ottawa government! And its dictatorship is to go on, is it? If so the Ontario government has the guarantee of continued power, and Mr. Meredith and his friends will remain in the cold shades of opposition until their usefulness is gone. To advertise them as nonentities is the unkind est cut of all.

#### EDITORIAL NOTES.

White ribbon societies-personal purity associations-are connected with one of the greatest movements of the times. They are worthy of the special encouragement of the churches. Purity and temperance are virtues which cannot be too highly extolled, especially by those who believe in Christian influence and Christian example.

The Empire is continually fighting ghosts. It is persistently attacking the liberals because it says they are running down Canada and are regarding it as an "impotent country which, however, may be developed if handed over to the great and glorious republic, whose citizenship these men hope to resume or adopt." Bosh, bosh! The men who write it ought to be ashamed of themselves. They are discounting the intelligence of the people.

St. Louis does not afford evidence in suppart of the reforming tendencies of the high license system. It was introduced in Janu ary, 1883. The license fee for the ordinary saloon was then suddenly raised from \$85 to \$550. It has been maintained at \$550 ever since. Statistics show that under the \$85 license St. Louis had 1,800 saloons, and she has about the same number now under a \$550 license. The number of arrests for drunkenness and disorderly conduct has largely increased. Still more the higher revenues are so much appreciated by the council that they cannot think of abandoning them. The high license is, therefore, an obstruction to prohibition.

Detroit has tried the storage motor on the street cars, and finds that one charge will propel a car, loaded, at the rate of ten miles an hour for ten hours. Such, indeed, has been the success of the experiment, that it is suggested that electricity take the place of horse power on all the leading thoroughfares of the great cities, seeing that it is noiseless, that it is easily controlled, that it is not damaging to the pavement, and that it makes no dirt. The only point yet unsettled is the cost of the power, its cheapness in comparison with other motors. This is the point of general interest, the point that most concerns, we' opine, the present owners of the Kingston street railway.

These little ones were there, bringing flowers as an of fering to their benefactress. Young women, teachers, governesses, unemployed servants, for whose benefit the mission home had been especially established, were there to express their gratitude and cordial congratulations to one who had so nobly served them. There were also many of the poor and friendless who had been for years so kindly and devotedly cared for. To these special circumstances may be added the interesting fact that the beautiful little church in which the ceremony was celebrated had been built through the devoted labours of Miss Leigh, who now stood as a bride before its altar. All this gave to the ceremony a very special and touching impressiveness. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers and

The ceremony was celebrated by the Right Rev. Bishop of Quebec, Canada, assisted by the nev. George Washington, M.A., rector of Victoria church, Paris, and the Rev. R. T. de Carteret, chaplain of Christ church, Neuilly. After the ceremony, a reception, very largely attended, was held at the mission home, avenue Wagram. The bride and bridegroom then left for a brief visit to the south of France, bearing with them the earnest, loving good wishes of a host of devoted

And, also, authorizing the liquidators to compromise all calls, and liability to calls, debts, and liabilities capable of resulting in debts, and all claims, whether present or luture, certain or contingent, ascertained or only sounding in er contingent, ascertair ed or only sounding in damages, subsisting, or only supposed to subsist, between the company and any contribu-tory or other debtor, or person apprehending liability to the company; and all questions in any way relating to or affecting the assets of the company, or the winding up of the com-pany, upon the receipt of such sums, payable at such times, and generally upon such terms, as may be agreed upon; with power for the liqui-dators to take any security for the discharge of such debts or liabilities, and to give a complete discharge in respect of all or any such calls.
