Dreams-Events in a Dream Crowded. Into a Minute.

The majority of dreams are only of momentary duration, though extended occasionally to the length of a minute. In proof of this Dr. Scholz tells the following story from his experience: "After excessive bodily fatigue and a day of mental strain, of a not disagreeable kind, I betook myself to bed after I had wound my watch and placed it on the night table. Then I lay down beside a burning lamp. Soon I found myself on the high sea on board a well known ship. I was again young and stood on the lookout. heard the roar of the water and golden clouds floated around me. How long I stood so I did not know, but it seemed a very long time. Then the scene changed. I was in the country and my long dead parents came to greet me; they took me to church, where the loud organ sounded. I was delighted, but at the same time wondered to see my wife and chil-

The priest mounted the pulpit and preached, but I could not understand what he said for the sound of the organ, which continued to play. I took my son by the hand and with him ascended the church tower, but again the scene was changed. Instead of being near my son, I stood near an early known but long dead officer-I ought to explain that I was an army surgeon during the maneuvers. I was wondering why the major-should look so young, when quite close in my ears a cannon sounded. Terrified, I was hurgying off, when I woke up and noticed that the supposed cannon shot had its cause in the opening of the bedroom door through some one entering. It was as if I had lived through an eternity in my dream, but when I looked at my watch I saw that since I had fallen asleep not more than one minute had elapsed."

A Coral Coast.

Professor James D. Dana in his book "Corals and Coral Islands," gives the following: Nearing in a vessel a coral bound coast, the first sign of the reef, when the tide is well in, is a line of heavy breakers perhaps miles in length, off a great distance from the land, On closer view some spots of reef may be distinguished as the waves retreat for another plunge; but the next moment all again is an interminable line of careering waters, Happy for the cruiser in untried reef regions if the surging waves continue to mark the line of reef; for a treacherous quiet sometimes intervenes, which seems to be evidence of deep waters ahead, and the unsuspecting craft dashes onward, but soon is grinding over the coral masses, then thumping heavily at short intervals and in a few moments more is landed helpless on the coral reef. The heavier billows as they roll by a vessel in such a plight have a way of lifting it and then letting it drop with its weight against the bottom and hence, unless prompt escape is in some way secured, the assaulting waves main speedy possession and soon after make complete the work of destruction. At low tide the breakers often cease, or nearly so. But the raf for the most part is then in full view, and with a good look out aloft, favorable winds and plenty of daylight, navigation is conquentively safe.

The First Oaster.

To the question who was the first man, woman or child to cat the first oyster, how was it eaten and was it enjoyed, answer has

been made by The New York Sun: The first oyster was not eaten-it died. It was not until the time of William the Conqueror that oysters were eaten. In the year 1039, in the month of September, a younger son of an impoverished French family swam the channel to England. In clambering up some rocks out of the water-it was low tide -he put his hand on a stone, as he thought. The stone, however, closed upon his fingers, pinching them severely. With his trusty sword he pried the rock open and released his Engers, which he put into his mouth to comfort. He tasted something so delicious that he forget his pain. His hunger overcame his prudence, and he, though with fear, swallowed the moist mass that lay in the "stone" he had opened. It was an oyster, and he was the first to cat one! We have forgotten the name of this hero, but are not his deeds related in Beeten's Annual for 1865! They are of a verity. Really, though, ovsters have been eaten since the time of the Greeks and Romans. . .

Baggage Handled. In the centennial year the number of pieces of baggage handled by the Pennsylvania railroad company amounted to 1,600,000, which was the highest point reached up to that time, and was then considered a remarkable record for the year. Those figures, however, dwindle into insignificance when compared with these of the year just closed. In 1888 the number of separate pieces handled reached 5,200,000, representing an aggregate money value of at least \$300,000,000. These figures only include "outbound" baggage or that which has been checked and forwarded. The "inbound" receipts amount to about 1,800,000 pieces, aggregating a grand total of 5,000,000 pieces handled. Of this number, it is reported, only three pieces were lost en route from starting point to destination.

Velocity of Sound.

The velocity of sound through the air in a temperature of 62 degs, Fahrenheit is 1,125 feet per second. The velocity of sound through water is 414 times, through iron 10 times, and through wood from 11 to 17 times that in air. Sound may be heard as follows: A powerful human voice in the open air, and no wind, 400 feet; beating a drum, 10,560 feet; music of a heavy brass band, 15,840 feet; report of a musket, 16,000 feet, and cannonading, very strong, 475,000 feet. In the Arctic regions conversation has been maintained over water at a distance of 6,696 feet.

I. H. S.

The initials I. H. S. signify, "Jesus, Men's Se viour." In German these letters stand for I(esus), II(eiland), S(eligmacher), i. e., "Jesus, Saviour, Sanctifier." In Greek, I(esous), H(emeteros), S(oter), i. e., "Jesus, Our Saviour." In Latin, I(esus), H(ominum), S(alvator', i. e., "Jesus, Men's Saviour." Brewer suggests that those who would like an English equivalent may adopt J(esus), H(eavenly), S(aviour).

High and Low Pressure Engine.

The main difference between a high pressure and a low pressure engine is that the latter works with a partial vacuum on the preceding side of the piston, made by condensing the steam and thus adding about thirteen pounds to its effective work for every square inch of the cylinder area.

RIDING A MAD BULL.

A Jerseyman Has an Exciting Experience on a Frightened Bovine's Back. NEW YORK, March 13. - Silas Morton, of

Kingsland, N.J., had an exciting experience with a bull. Morton was leading the animal home, when a dog ran at it and bit his hind leg. The bull, mad with pain, rushed at Morton, and before he realized what had occurred the animal caught him up on his horns and threw him over its head. Morton alighted on the bull's back, and, fearing a second attack, concluded to stay there until he could receive assistance. Lying upon his breast and seizing the animal's horns he held himself on. Morton hollered for help. The bull was now thoroughly angered and made frantic attempts to shake off the rider. Finding his efforts fruitless the animal, with the dog still at his heels, started upon a run in the direction of the river. When the track of the Erie railroad was reached the beast concluded to take the roadbed for a course and went up the track at breakneck speed. The animal was now springing along at such a gait that Morton was afraid to let go his hold, while visions of approaching trains appeared to his mind at every jump of the bull. While running on this course Morton was made painfully aware of a num ber of telegraph poles along the line by the force with which his limbs struck them in passing. The beast suddenly left the track and headed up the avenue again. It made direct for an opening in a shed which was scarcely larger than the size of the bull. Not waiting to examine the aperture the beast rushed through, tearing the boards on both sides and leaving the trousers and flesh upon Morton's limbs in shreds. Morton, through fear or loss of presence of mind, still held on tenaciously. The animal then ran down the bank of a second river and plunged into the water.

The noise of the frightened fowls attracted Andrew Schaffenburg's attention, and when he reached the yard he saw the bull and man disappear under the bridge crossing the river. He hurried to the other side and saw the bull endeavoring to climb a steep embankment above the river. He found Morton lying in the shallow water in a faint. He had been knocked from the bull's back by contact with the archway of the bridge. His clothes were torn to ribbons, and the flesh on his legs hung in long strings. He was thoroughly exhausted from his wild ride, and was unable to explain how he managed to hold on so long. As it was impossible to capture the bull alive he was shot.

LEPROSY IS SPREADING.

The People of New South Wales Are Being Very Badly Frightened.

LONDON, March 13.—The British colonial office has received a despatch to the effect that leposy has put in an appearance among the Chinese in New South Wales, and that the cry for the prohibition of Chinese immigration had been again aroused by the popular dread of perhaps the most horrible disease which afflicts humanity.

The medical reports of the foreign customs refer frequently to the subject. It is said that five great epidemics have been recorded since the fifteenth century. It is spreading now to districts which were previously comparatively free from the scourge. The spread of the disease is due to the increased commuication by means of steamers along the coast and up the Yangtsze river.

The Chinese themselves appear to have pretty accurate notions about leprosy. They attribute it to infection, defective nutrition, and climate. They employ isolation and better diet as remedies. They distinguish five classes of the disease, and it is remarkable that in China, as in India, there are more male than female lepers.

In India the policy of the government in the treatment of lepers is avowedly based on the proposition that medical science has as yet discovered no remedy for the disease. That policy is practically to leave it alone, but to encourage the grant of medical relief to lepers in voluntary hospitals and special asylums.

To any one who has travelled in India among Indians and other Orientals, the marvel is that so many are free from the taint of leprosy, seeing that lepers go about like ordinary people, marry and are given in marriage. Fortunately, leprosy will only flourish in congenial soil, and it is rare that the average European suffers from accidental contact.
