THE STRUGGLE OF THE SEXES.

How Women Outlive Men—Do Cities Produce More Girls Than Boys?

In 1880 there were fifty millions of people in this country, and about 8,200,000 more males than females. That was only because more males were born; the females live the longest. Of the centenarians 1,409 were men and 2,007 were women.

The boys start out nearly a million ahead and are in the majority until the sixteenth year, when the girls are a little more numerous. Sweet sixteen is a numerous age, anyhow. After that, first one and then the other is in the majority, the girls gradually gaining after thirty-six, and leaving the men far behind after seventy-five. To balance this longevity of the females, in almost every state a few more boys are born; not many more, but almost always a few. It is astonishing to see where the census gives thousands and hundreds of thousands of boys and girls under one year old; there are, with one or two exceptions, always a few hundred more boys, and only a few hundred more.

In only six of the forty-nine states and territories are more girls born, and in these states they are very slightly in excess—from eleven to eighty. These exceptions are Arizona, Delaware, Florida, Louisiana, Montana and North Carolina.

The fact that the females are in the majority in all the original thirteen states but Delaware and North Carolina, especially in Massachusetts and New England, has created the impression that there is something in the climate or in the people that produces more women than men. This is a popular but egregious error. In Massachusetts there were in 1890 437 more boys than girls under one year of age. The males are in the minority in almost all the eastern states, because many of the young men go west. All over the west there is an excess of men, and those who are not foreigners have been withdrawn from the states farther east. In the new states and territories this is most noticeable. In Idaho, for instance, there are twice as many males as females, but the male infants are only a little in excess of the females.

The west is drawing heavily on the manhood of the east. From this all the old states have suffered. Massachusetts seems to have lost more than any. There are parts of northern Ohio which are portions of New England removed. Massachusetts shows the loss and Ohio shows the gain.

Another curious fact is that while all over the country more boys than girls are born, in cities and towns there are more girls.

Between the ages of five and seventeen inclusive there are 4,680 more girls than boys in New York county, 1,708 more in Kings county, 2,725 more in the city of Baltimore, 1,033 more in Suffolk county, Mass. (Boston), 2,000 more in Cook county (Chicago), Ill.; 2,131 more in the city of St. Louis, 1,971 more in Philadelphia county and 2,633 more in the parish of New Orleans. All these cities except New Orleans are in states where more boys than girls are born.

In Georgia there are 137 counties, and in all but 26 of them there are more boys than girls. The excess of girls is about in proportion to population. Savannah leads off with 523 more girls than boys; Atlanta, 385; Augusta, 304; Macon, 154; Columbus, 131; Cartersville, 123; Rome, 59; Athens, 59; Albany, 16; Griffin, 11, and Americus, 7.

Savannah, though she has a somewhat smaller population than Atlanta, has a larger excess of girls. This seems to be peculiar to old cities. It is so with Baltimore, New Orleans and New York. The excess is greater in New Orleans than anywhere else. Is this a peculiarity of the French?

The facts present a question worth studying. Are there fewer men in the cities than in the country?—Philadelphia Times.

Selina Dolore's First Appearance. An English actress says of the late Selina Dolore's first appearance on the stage: "In the latter part of 1861 and during the whole of 1862 a fair, sweet faced little girl, with rich dark copper tinted hair and large soft brown eyes, a face for Raphael's brush, used to sit almost nightly in the orchestra, near the drum (on an enviable seat, beside a near relative, who was one of the admirable band of the Lyceum theatre during the run of the memorable 'Peep o' Day,' which for fourteen months drew both country and town. Presently this gazelle like little maiden would disappear from beside the drum and be seen shyly leading the blind harper (Mr. John Carter) through his scene; and this child was Selina Dolore, certainly not more than 8 years old, so that she could not have been over 26 when she died."

GRANT'S RAILWAY SIGNAL.

An Exhibition Given at a Railway Crossing To-day—Worked Successfully.

To-day an exhibition was given, before railway managers, at Cataract crossing, G. T. R., of Grant's railway crossing signal. For years inventions have been made of signals, but so far few have met with success. They have been too complicated. But Grant's signal is easy of manipulation—and is one that must meet with commendation. Mr. Grant has been at work at the signal for many months. He developed various signals, discovered the faulty points, reconstructed his models until he has one now that seems to meet every requirement. The signal is self working; no electricity is required. The bell is located at the crossing, on a frame which bears also the simple machinery required to work it. About two hundred yards up the track is a lever eight and a half feet long. In the centre it rises three eighths of an inch above the track, and the pressure upon it of the car wheels works it, and by the ingenious contrivance of a revolving shaft and springs pulls back a shaft which revolves cog wheels, drives back the hammer of the bell and alarms the community. The bell rings once for every car, but it can be sounded at longer or shorter intervals as is desired. The lever can be placed at any required distance from the bell. The alarm can be sounded from either side of the crossing. No slack wire is required. Two spiral springs, located between posts and at either end of the line, keep an even tension, for, as one spring gives, another takes up any slack that might be created. The whole arrangement is very simple, and is made so as to prevent friction, and consequently the wearing of parts is almost an impossibility. Snow and rain cannot affect the working of the signal as the machinery upon the frame can be entirely enclosed. It is the most complete railway signal we have seen.

Mr. Riddel, assistant superintendent of the G. T. R., accompanied by Mr. Hollingshead, mechanical engineer, and Mr. Lambert, district engineer, met the committee at Cataract for the test of the signal. They had a single engine and tender, and gave it a severe test. The signal gave satisfactory alarms. The assistant superintendent and his staff expressed themselves satisfied with the principle of the signal, and promising to devote more time to the testing of it, at an early day. The time devoted to this test did not exceed 30 minutes.


