A SUMMER CARNIVAL. When Dr. W. G. Beers, of Montreal, during a visit to the city, suggested that Kingston should make a new departure in carnivals and hold a summer event he interested the people, but did not move them. The idea was cursorily discussed, and generally disposed of as impracticable. And yet the leading men of the city did not get together, and did not debate the issue; if they had perhaps the scheme would have been differently regarded. This we are satisfied of, and the thought is an unpleasant one when we contrast the apathy of our people with the activity of the citizens of graph announces a summer carnival, to occur in July, to last for ten days, and to include all kinds of sports on land and water, street pageants, etc. It is intimated that "St. John will again prove to Canada that no more spirited or go-ahead people are to be found anywhere than those who live at the mouth of the river St. John, and in the coming winter port of Canada." And the management show how shrewd and farseeing they can be by asking the press association of Ontario to extend their summer excursion to St. John and become witnesses of "a uniquely attractive programme." Of course St. John began its preparations for the car. nival long since. But once the movement was deemed expedient it gained in force and popularity. The Kingston people have a lesson to learn. They must see more than they do the advisability of advertising the city in every possible way. They must do all they can to make the place attractive, to bring people here, and to please them when they are here. There is plenty of enterprise in our population, but they want it to be put to more account. Energy properly directed, and money properly spent, will lead to good results. The revelations in connection with the work of the public accounts committee, at the present session of parliament, are without a parallel. This committee has to do with all questions of supply, and upon it are some of the best men in parliament. The gov. ernment's interests are usually guarded by several ministers, and the chairman, Mr. Rykert, may be depended upon to rule in favor of his party every time a ruling is called for. The sessions of the committee during the past week have been particularly lively. Led by Mr. Mulock the liberals have thrown several bombshells into the tory camp; and the end of the sensations have not yet been reached.

The debates on ministers' travelling expenses have been most acrimonious, though not less so than those relating to the cost and quality of the volunteer clothing. The fact came out that in recent years tenders have not been asked for the clothing, but it has been supplied by certain tories, chief of whom is Senator Sanford, and that he was given his own prices apparently by way of recompensing him for his magnificent contributions to the tory campaign fund. The

idea of calling upon the senator-a contractor with the government now illegally—to produce his cheque book created a panic in the committee. We quote the Globe's correspondence:

Mr. Bowell spoke in the same strain. Mr. Somerville pointed out that in the branch of the public service controlled by Mr. Bowell when irregularities were charged the officers of the department not merely called for cheque books, but took charge of all books and papers.

Mr. Lister contended the committee must be guided by the same rules as a public court. The government practically stood charged with giving contracts at extravagant prices is desirable or necessary. and under unprecedented circumstances. If this were done to make good expenditures improperly made by Senator Sanford te debauch the constitutencies in the government's interest the committee should know

Sir Richard Cartwright pointed out that appear. there was a law prohibiting the government from giving contracts to members of either house of parliament, and though Senator Sanford's firm was an incorporated company, yet Mr. Sanford would not deny that he and his immediate relatives got the benefit of its operations.

The chairman read Mr. Mulock's motion as written, and ruled it out of order. This ruling saved the formality of a vote.

Mr. Mulock stated that he had received communications from a merchant of high standing because of which he would move for the production of samples of the clothing issued to the several corps which went into camp at Niagara last year. He was informed that there were great complaints made by some of the corps and that the company of the Queen's Own, under Capt. C. C. Bennett, had sent to England for uniforms, paying for them out of their own pockets. He believed a number of gentlemen could give important evidence on this subject, and he moved to have them subpornaed.

This motion aroused a great deal of discussion. The members of the government would not allow even this to pass. They insisted upon Mr. Mulock going on with the examination of Mr. Watson, inspector of clothing of the militia department.

The committee declined at present to call the witnesses, but when a moment later Dr. Bergin said that Lieut, Irving, of Toronto, could give "startling" evidence, and moved that Lieut. Irving should be called, the motion was put and carried without dissent.

Here is the evidence of an attempt to burk enquiring. The liberals have got at a scandal of no mean proportions, and the government knows it. They must let all the light into their enquiries possible or stand guilty of all that is charged against them. The howls of the Empire, that Mr. Mulock seeks to represent Senator Saneford as a "scoundrel," a "boodler," and a "rogue" will not prevent the liberal member for York doing his duty. If he cannot establish what he is aiming at let him be called bad names, but the evidence must come out, and the people must judge their representatives by it. Senator Sandford may be a good Methodist and conservative and citizen of Hamilton, but these are not the points under discussion at present.

#### DON'T BE ALARMED.

The Empire is doing its level best to arouse the people. The attempt was made to warm up the conservative party in viewof an early dissolution of the federal parliament (contemplated not long since) and as it tailed our contemporary changes its tactics. It professes to have some information anent a surprise which Mr. Mowat is said to have under consideration, and so annouces:

"The indications are strong that the wily premier of the province will try again to catch the conservatives napping, and spring an election when they least expect it, but whether the election is brought on prematurely, or the legislature is permitted to run its regular time, we direct attention to the fact that the elections must take place on the voters' lists to be made up from the assessment rolls now being prepared. The assessors throughout the province are at work, time is slipping away, and we call on our friends in every municipality to be up and doing, that not one name entitled to be on may be omitted from the rolls. Do not put off the work, thinking that these names can be got on by appeal afterward. It can be done easily and effectively now, but if put off till the time for appeal the work will be three times as difficult, and the probabi lity is that many names will be left off that could be got on if attended to now. A few days of earnest work now in each municipality will tell in turning out the government humbug and hypocrisy when the time for voting comes."

The Empire is more candid than its friends. They sought to steal a march on the liberals and had confidential circulars, issued from Ottawa, calling upon the party managers to be active, above all to be watchful of the assessors. The conservative officials were to be conferred with and coached as to the partizan manner in which they were to do their duty; the grit officials were to be watched less they should violate their oath of office and fail to do their duty. The circular getting into the press the object of it has been defeated. And so the Empire drops all disguise and publicly appeals to its friends to fix up the voters' lists the best way they can. The warning will have an effect on all parties, and if the government is turned out it will be a surprise all round. Mr. Meredith certainly has no hope of becoming premier of the province when he is seeking a seat on the bench.
