LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Reply to Mr. F. Shibley. MOUNTAIN, March 22 .- (To the Editor) In your last issue of the WEEKLY WHIG I read a letter over the signature of Fred W. Shibley, which, if it be characteristic, renders his character easily understood. If you will be kind enough to allow me space in your interesting paper I will endeavour to point out the chief characteristic features as they appear to me. I shall not take up much space as the job is light and easy of

disposal. The most characteristic feature of that letter, according to my way of thinking, is a jaunty Yankeefied phraseology, falsehood and unpatriotism.

In taking a general survey of the letter in question the reader is at once struck with the jaunty trivial handling of the whole question, which is so peculiarly unsuitable to the subject of discourse, and so unworthy of an individual who talks publicly on question involving such issues as the consolidation of America. In fact, judging from the subject matter and execution one would take the author to be a Yankee. However he says he is a Canadian, but if his letter is a characteristic one I can see very little evidence that would lead me to believe he is such. Were I called on to classify him on the basis of instinct and feeling I would place him among a species of Yankee which inhabits the Atlantic sea board of the United States of America. If Mr. Shibley and the rest of his anmexation brethren, who prate in such a "silly" manner about annexation, are very anxious to vote in consolidated America I would advise them to shoot from guns of a heavier calibre and charge with steel instead of lead slugs. Mr. Shibley possesses the qualities which would render him a successful reporter on such an occasion as a holiday excursion, or a game at pug, but he certainly lacks the power necessary to generate a cement that will unite insoluble such heterogeneous elements as the Dominion of Canada and the United States of America. The second characteristic feature of his

letter is falsehood. This feature particularly characterizes his description and comparison of the two countries, the dominion of Canada and the United States of America. For instance he says the present govern ment of Canada is a dictatorship, and Sir John A. Macdonald is dictator. Is Mr. Shibley so ignorant of the form of government of the country to which he professes to have such a strong attachment not to know that the Canadian form of government is the same as that of Great Britain and Ireland, and that Sir John A. Macdonald is an individual elected by the people of his constituency to a seat in the house of representatives, where he has the privilege of freedom of speech and a vote the same as the rest of the Canadian representatives? Mr. Shibley sneeringly remarks: "Our governor-general makes viceregal processions through the country when the people gather from the back townships to see him and wonder" Mr. Shibley must have been reared in a back township if he does not know that the most intellectual, refined, and cultured Canadians assemble to listen with edification to our governor-general. Moreover he insiguates that the members of the Canadian legislature do not earn their salaries, and that they are idlers. In reply I would say they earn their salaries in a much more honourable manner than his American legislators, and their labours bear the mark of a courteous, independent statesmanship not exhibited by his American legislators. Our cabinet has never stooped to offer in. courtesies to a neighbouring nation for the purpose of gaining a political campaign. "Miss Canada," as Mr. Shibley calls her, | cord. remains long enough at home with her motells on the character of a nation as well as an individual. When a boy runs away from his mother and comes up himself he usually grows up "sassy." Mr. Shibley, referring to England, says: "We are all your children on this continent." False again, but I should let him down this time, for I believe his ideas are so large about the glorious republic that he thinks South America, Central America, and Mexico belong to it too. But they do not. Again he says, "See your son and daughter would be wedded." So we see this Mr. Shibley is not only an advocate of annexational union but of sister and brother. Well, what better

political morals could we expect from a man who advocates such views as he. But I must give Mr. Shibley credit for speaking some truths Foremost among these I see a truth as solemn as was ever uttered. He says in his description of the American people "they are sassy," and fur- of canvass. ther on he says "the great republic is willing to absorb the colonies." In these few words he has accurately described the attitude and desires of the American republic. But be it known to Mr. Shibley and his annexation brethren, as well as to the great republic, of which they are such ardent admirers, that Canada is not that species of bivalve which they take it to be when they speak of our absorption, but is a splendid representative of the highest type of mammalia, and must needs be disorganized by a process of pulverization before ready for the process of absorption. Does Mr. Shibley not know that before a substance is capable of being absorbed it must be reduced to a very fine powder by a process of rituration, or, what is a better condition, to a solution. If Mr. Shibley had even the patriotism of an oyster he would close his doors and resist unto death the humiliation of such a process

of reduction. Another true statement Mr. Shibley makes, is, "Canada's resources are unlimited but undeveloped." True, indeed! We belong to a country whose resources are unlimited and, whose future is destined to be glorious, if we but improve our opportunities in developing these resources. Shall we then, in view of reaping a temporary financial gain, or in view of gaining anything whatever, barter away the glorious prospects that illumens the future of Canada? Shall we dishonor the graves of our venerable fathers and noble patriots, who bled and died in establishing and defending it? Every fibre of a true Canadian's being should vibrate never. Oh mother of patriotism, wilt thou not secure the head of this thine erring, flatulent son in a gas hag so that his unpatriotic gas may float him into some lone region of that "great republic" there to await in solitude his opportunity to vote in "consolidated America!"
