Alphabetical List of Twenty-seven Flyers.

HAS TROTTING REACHED A LIMIT?

A Perfect Pen Picture of the Principal Horses on the Turf—Their Records and Their Pedigree Given in a Concise Form. An Invaluable List for Turf Men.

Here is a description of the twenty-seven leading horses of the turf, with their best records. This list will be found extremely useful to all lovers of horse racing. It is arranged in alphabetical order.

ARAB—Bay gelding (trotter), out of Lady Hamilton, by Arthurton; foaled in 1878. Best record 2:15, when 10 years old, at San Jose, Cal., on Sept. 29, 1888.

ARROW—Bay gelding (pacer), out of Crichton's first by A. W. Richmond; foaled in 1883. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 5 years old, at Cleveland, O., on Aug. 1, 1888.

BELLE HAMLIN—Brown mare (trotter), out of Toy, by Hamlin's Almont; foaled in 1879. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 6 years old, at Cleveland, O., on Sept. 16, 1887.

BEYBLOA GIRL—Bay mare (pacer), out of Kit Freeman, by Pochontas Boy; foaled in 1873. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 10 years old, at Buffalo, N. Y., on Aug. 2, 1883.

BROWN HALL—Brown horse (pacer), out of Lizzie, by Tom Hal; foaled in 1873. Best record 2:13, at Lexington, Ky., on Aug. 31, 1887.

CLINGSTONE—Bay gelding (trotter), out of Gretchen, by Rysdyk; foaled in 1875. Best record 2:14, when 7 years old, at Cleveland, O., July 28, 1882.

FAYONIA—Bay mare (trotter), out of Fadette, by Wedgewood; foaled in 1879. Best record 2:15, when 9 years old, at Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 10, 1888.

FLORA TEMPLE—Black mare (pacer), out of Untraced, by White Cloud; foaled in 1874. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 9 years old, at Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 10, 1888.

FULLER—Bay gelding (pacer), out of Dolly, by Clear Gut; foaled in 1878. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 5 years old, at Mayville, Md., May 17, 1883.

GAY—Black gelding (trotter), out of Flora Gardner, by Kentucky Prince; foaled in 1880. Best record 2:12, when 8 years old, at Cleveland, O., Oct. 29, 1888.

GOSPIN, JR.—Brown gelding (pacer), out of Nelly, by Gospin; foaled in 1873. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 11 years old, at Buffalo, N. Y., on Aug. 8, 1888.

HARRY WILKES—Bay gelding (trotter), out of Molly Walker, by George Wilkes; foaled in 1875. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 11 years old, at Sacramento, Cal., on April 2, 1887.

JAY EYE-SEE—Black gelding (trotter), out of Midnight, by Dictator; foaled in 1878. Best record 2:10, when 6 years old, at Providence, R. I., Aug. 1, 1884.

JOHNSON—Bay gelding (pacer), out of Dana, by Ned Forrest, by Joe Racost; foaled in 1877. Best record 2:09 1/4, when 7 years old, at Chicago, Ill., Oct. 3, 1886.

LITTLE MAC—Bay gelding (pacer), by Kentuck Dan (dam not traced); foaled in 1874. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 7 years old, at Detroit, Mich., July 23, 1886.

LITTLE BROWN JIM—Bay gelding (pacer), out of Lizzie, by Tom Hal; foaled in 1875. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 6 years old, at Hartford, Conn., Aug. 4, 1881.

MAUD S.—Chestnut mare (trotter), out of Miss Russell, by Harold; foaled in 1874. Best record 2:08 1/4, when 11 years old, at Cleveland, O., July 30, 1885.

MAJOLICA—Bay gelding (trotter), out of Jessie Kirk, by Starke; foaled in 1874. Best record 2:15, when 9 years old, at Providence, R. I., Sept. 5, 1885.

MATTIE HENNER—Chestnut mare (pacer), out of Unknown, by Prince Pulaski; foaled in 1872. Best record 2:12, when 9 years old, at Pittsburg, Pa., July 16, 1881.

PATRON—Bay stallion (trotter), out of Beatrice, by Pancoast; foaled in 1882. Best record 2:14 1/4, when 5 years old, at Cleveland, O., July 29, 1887.

PRINCE WILKES—Chestnut gelding (trotter), out of Rose Chief, by Red Wilkes; foaled in 1881. Best record 2:14 1/4, when 7 years old, at Cleveland, O., Aug. 3, 1888.

ROSALINE WILKES—Bay mare (trotter), out of Cigarette, by Com's Harry Wilkes; foaled in 1882. Best record 2:14 1/4, when 6 years old, at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Aug. 21, 1888.

RICHARDS—Brown gelding (pacer), out of Geneva, by King Pharaoh; foaled in 1875. Best record 2:12 1/4, when 7 years old, at Pittsburg, Pa., July 27, 1883.

ROWDY BOY—Black gelding (pacer), out of Untraced, by Bull Pup; foaled in 1871. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 8 years old, at Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 14, 1879.

STAMBOL—Brown stallion, out of Fleetwing, by Sultan; foaled in 1882. Best record 2:14 1/4, when 6 years old, at San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 26, 1888.

WESTMONT—Chestnut gelding (pacer), out of Annie, by Almont; foaled in 1875. Best record 2:13 1/4, when 8 years old, at Providence, R. I., Sept. 11, 1884.

First on the list of trotters comes the queen of the turf, the \$40,000 purchase of Robert Bonner from the late W. R. Vanderbit. Maud S. early showed an ability to trot fast, and with the exception of the start day for which Jay-Eye-See held the supremacy her mark has been the object for the attack of the whole trotting world for years.

black son of Dictator. He was comparatively unknown the year before. He is now 9 years of age.

Stamboul, the great son of Sultan, is one of the three trotting stallions now living that have gone better than 2:13. Stamboul is 7 years of age, by a great sire out of a well bred dam, whose only produce have been fast or producers of speed.

The fastest clip ever shown at any gait recognized by the National Association of Trotting Horse Breeders is the 2:06 1/4 of pacer Johnson, which was made in Chicago in 1884.

The long jump between Johnson and the next in order is one which four years of work has not served to lessen. Not a single one of the full twenty-seven date their performance beyond 1879, and of the number eight were not foaled when Rowdy Boy made his record.

The improvement in the track could not be attested by any statement of facts to such an extent as a careful study of the table will show. The better to testify to the work of progress the accompanying statement of the record at different decades since 1800 may be found interesting.

From 1800 to 1810 the only mark better than 3 minutes was held by Yankee, and was made at Harlem, June 18, 1806. Wallace claims that this mark was made on a short track.

From 1810 to 1820 two horses got marks as good as 3 minutes. One of these was Boston Blue, who at Jamaica, N. Y., in 1818, trotted in 3 minutes flat. Eight years prior to that Boston Horse won a mile in 2:48.

In the next decade the long distance records were the order of the day. In the following ten years Edwin Forrest trotted in 2:31 1/4, while Sally Miller completed a mile in 2:37. Onida Chief passed a mile in 2:41 and in 1829 Drovers got under the wire in 2:28.

Between the years 1830-60, Flora Temple flourished as the greatest living trotter. In 1830 she made her great 2:19 1/4 record, which stood till 1867, when Dexter cut it down by two and a half seconds.

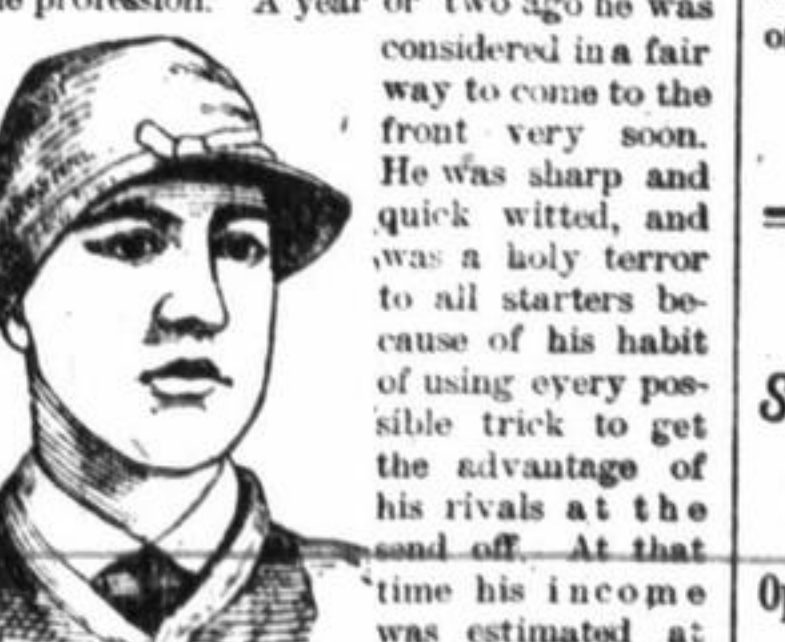
The fastest stallions by records that have ever lived are Maxie Cobb, Phalias, Patron and Brown Hal (the pacer). Mares are Maud S., Belle Hamlin, Goldsmith Maid and Trinket; geldings, Jay-Eye-See, St. Julien, Rarus and Harry Wilkes.

Of the horses above mentioned, some enjoy some special distinction. Maud S. not only has the fastest mile on record, but has the best mark in a race, 2:13 1/4, and with Aldine has the record (double) against time, 2:15 1/4. The record (double) in a race is held by Arab and Conde, 2:18 1/4. Johnston is the fastest pacer against time and in a race to wagon.

It is interesting to note that since 1830 the side wheelers have always led the van. They have had the best of the gait from first to last. Onida Chief beat Edwin Forrest's time. The gelding Unknown beat Lady Suffolk's record.

The yearling class has three prominent representatives. The first and greatest is Norlane, by Norval, from Elaine. She trotted a full mile in 1887 in 2:31 1/4. Studie D., the daughter of Fanny Clay by Sherman Hambletonian, has shown a mile in 2:35 1/4, while Linda Rose, by Elector, dam Beautiful Bells, by the Moor, has 2:36 1/4 to her credit at this age.

John McCarthy, Jockey. Here is a picture of John McCarthy, the well known jockey, who died of consumption recently at New Orleans. McCarthy was 24 years old. His father before him was a jockey, and his brother Andy follows the same profession.
