A FOE OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Chamber of Deputies Divide on the Subject—The Government Sustained. PARIS, April 4.—The Chamber of Deputies agreed to the immediate assembling of the Bureau for the purpose of electing a committee on the prosecution of Boulanger.

After speeches by the members a vote was taken on the question of sanctioning the prosecution of Boulanger, the Chamber deciding 355 to 203 in favor of prosecution.

Paris, April 4.—The National Committee of the Boulangist party announces that Boulanger departed from France by the advice of the committee.

Senator Naquet, Deputies Laisant and Laguerre wrote to Boulanger about the middle of March advising him to flee.

BRUSSELS, April 4.—M.M. Laguerre, Laisant, Leherrisse, Naquet, Millevoy and Fanconiere have arrived here.

BRUSSELS, April 4.—Boulanger says if he is expelled from Belgium he will go to England.

KIEL, April 4.—The German naval authorities have ordered the cruiser Habicht and the gunboat Wolf to be put in readiness at once to proceed to Samoa.

BRUSSELS, April 4.—Advice received here from Stanley Falls state that Arabs who have arrived there report that Henry M. Stanley and Emin Pasha were heard from in February.

BERLIN, April 4.—One hundred and forty Abatians have been fined 600 marks each for failing to report for service in the German army.

A COLD DAY FOR THE ACT

SEVENTEEN CONSTITUENCIES "VOTED WET" YESTERDAY.

The Scott Acters Fail to Get There in Every Instance—Full Returns of the Poll—Comparison With Previous Votes.

TORONTO, April 4.—Fifteen counties and two cities voted yesterday on the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act.

The table below shows the majorities for repeal in the elections yesterday together with the majorities by which the act was originally adopted in the various places and the date of the last election:

Every place in Wellington gave a majority against the act. In Lennox and Addington only two places gave majorities against repeal.

The greatest change was in Kent. On Jan. 15, 1885, the act was carried by 2393 majority and yesterday it was buried by 1700 majority.

Gloucester is the only place in Carleton reporting a majority against repeal.

Last year fourteen counties voted on the act. Westmoreland, N.B., and Richmond, Que., gave majorities for the act.

Oxford Hotel-keepers Jubilant. Woodstock, April 4.—The interest here over the result of the Scott Act contests in the various counties to-day has been intense.

Supplementary Estimates. A Little Over Two Millions Asked—The Total for 1888-89 \$37,893,389.

OTTAWA, April 4.—The supplementary estimates of expenditure for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1889, were submitted this afternoon.

Adding the amounts voted in the previous estimates the totals for 1888-89 are found to be \$37,893,389 chargeable to consolidated fund and \$9,712,912 chargeable to capital account.

THE MOST FAVORED NATION. Senator Wark Introduces His Anti-Restricted Reciprocity Resolution.

OTTAWA, April 4.—The attention of the Senate was to-day devoted to this resolution proposed by Hon. Mr. Wark.

Resolved as the opinion of this House that in view of the fostering care extended by the Mother Country to her colonies from their infancy, as well as for the favorable terms on which their products have always been admitted in her markets, it would be unjust to the United Kingdom to levy higher duties on goods imported from thence than on goods of the same character imported from any foreign country.

Speaking in support of his own motion Senator Wark expressed regret that the movement to prevent the closer union of the colonies had been spoken of in very disrespectful terms in some quarters on this side the Atlantic.

Senator Power followed and the debate was adjourned.

MOVED THE MILL TO CANADA. A Michigan Firm's Scheme to Avoid Payment of a Mortgage.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., April 4.—Deputy-Sheriff Jones of Detour arrived here last night and stated that Molles Brothers of that place, who are largely engaged in lumbering in this vicinity, have packed up their goods to leave for Canada.

HALIFAX, April 4.—Judge Ritchie delivered judgment to-day ordering the extradition of Henry Hardie, the New York forger, and remanded the prisoner for 15 days in order that the papers may be sent to Ottawa for signature.

IN CANADA BY THIS TIME. ELmira, N.Y., April 4.—George W. Ward, assistant postmaster in this city, has disappeared and \$1500 of Government funds are missing.

The Grand Trunk's Interstate Case. WASHINGTON, April 4.—The Interstate Commerce Commission to-day began the hearing of the case of the Grand Trunk Company of Canada upon a charge contained in an order of the commission issued March 26 of violating the Interstate Commerce Law by granting rebates on traffic taken from points in the United States to points in Canada and by charging less than their published rates on such shipments.

OTTAWA, April 4.—Hon. John Carling has given notice of this resolution: "That it is expedient to provide that the amount due on certain loans amounting in the aggregate to \$96,400, made to Mennonite immigrants on the security of members of that community resident in Ontario, should be computed as though the interest stipulated had been 4 per cent simple interest instead of 6 per cent compound interest, and that payment in full may be adopted on the basis of such computation."
