J. H. M'VICKER.

Points in the Life of a Veteran Theatrical Manager.

Mr. J. H. M'Vicker, the prominent Chicago theatrical manager, is one of the best known and most universally respected men who have ever had anything to do with the stage. Every one in Chicago knows him, and many are conversant with his efforts to elevate the profession. For nearly half a century he has been connected with the stage, and has been the personal friend of many of the most noted actors and actresses.

Mr. M'Vicker was born in New York in 1822, of Scotch-Irish stock. He lost his father when a child, became a printer, and in 1840, while in New Orleans, decided to take to the stage. In 1848 he went to Chicago, which he has since always made his home. In 1851 he purchased the right to Dan Marble's plays and began to star. He went to England and was well received there. But Mr. M'Vicker was destined to become a manager, and he built his theatre in Chicago. It is one of the oldest in that city, and for many years ranked first, if not second, in the profession that several actors and actresses of means sprung forward with their checks in their hands and M'Vicker did not want for means wherewith to rebuild.

Mr. M'Vicker has occasionally appeared on the boards to assist some noted star with whom he was on terms of intimacy. He would take the part of the grave digger with Booth, who was his son-in-law, and Charlotte Cushman once got him to play with her in "Simpson & Co." He is such a favorite in Chicago that his name on the bills in any part is no light assistant in filling the house.

SOME EXCELLENT RECIPES.

Pineapple Jelly.

One-half box gelatine, one cup sugar, one cup cold water, one large cup boiling water, one gill sherry, one cupful-chopped canned pineapple and a gill of the liquor from the can.

Stir the sugar into the gelatine, the latter being first soaked an hour in the cup of cold water. Add the pineapple liquor, the wine and the boiling water. Strain, stir in the pineapple and set to form in a mold wet with cold water.

A variation of this recipe is banana jelly made by substituting chopped banana and the juice of a lemon for the pineapple.

Cooked Celery.

Cooked celery is liked by many people and is considered even more wholesome than the raw article. Cut it in small cross sections, using nearly the entire stalk and roots, rejecting only the very green parts. Cook it in but little water, so that when very tender the water will have boiled nearly away; then add milk sufficient for a nice gravy; season to taste with salt and pepper; rub butter and flour to a smooth paste and add sufficient to make it of a creamy consistency. When the flour is scalded it is done.

New England Doughnuts.

A Boston housewife furnishes the following recipe: Two cupfuls of sugar, six cupfuls of flour, one pint of milk, butter size of two English walnuts; spice to taste. After thoroughly mixing the above add half a cupful of yeast for a third of a yeast cake well dissolved. Let rise five hours; roll, cut and fry in plenty of hot lard. I sometimes add two well beaten eggs, the last thing before rolling out. It is not necessary, but sometimes an improvement.

Quick Breakfast Cakes.

If the directors for hot pans and oven are followed a housekeeper vouches that the following never fail, are very light and delicious with good coffee: One pint of flour, one pint of water, and two eggs. Take half the water and stir in part of the flour to prevent lumping, then as it thickens add the rest of the water and flour. Beat the eggs thoroughly and add last with a small pinch of salt. The pans must be very hot and the oven quick.

Dining Room Dots.

Glass spoons for pickles are something new. Salted almonds are served on oyster shells of antique silver, gold lined. The spoon to serve them with has a bowl in the shape of a mussel.

Flat bonbonnières for table use are almost as large as a plate, the cover decorated with painted Kate Greenway figures, and tied with bright colored ribbons.

The Brood Mare Tackey.

The accompanying cut represents the famous brood mare Tackey, a speed performer herself and a reproducer of extreme speed to the second and third generation. Tackey was by the phenomenal sire of brood mares, Pilot, Jr., and her dam was Jenny Lind, by Bellefounder. Tackey was foaled thirty years ago, and was bred by C. G. McHatton, of St. Louis. At St. Louis, on June 18, 1866, she trotted against John A. Logan and Frank, defeating them in straight heats in 2:34, 2:32, and 2:34. On June 26 she met Pilot Temple, John A. Logan and Nabockish, and was again victorious in 2:28, 2:28 and 2:29.

In September, 1867, she met Silas Rich, Molly Fearless and Dixie, and was again the victor.

Her time was 2:30, 2:29, and 2:26. With this excellent record she was sent to the stud. By Gooding's Champion she produced in 1875 the bay filly Naid Queen, which proved to be a fast and game campaigner, and obtained a record of 2:30. In 1878 she produced Pilot Boy, by Major Lucas. In 1880 Pilot Boy trotted to a record of 2:30. In 1881 she had a gray colt by Warwick Boy, called Class Leader, and in 1887 he trotted in 2:22.

We have here three fast trotters with records of 2:22, or better from three different sires out of the same mare. But if we go one step further her speed transmitting value is more clearly demonstrated. In 1879 she produced by Happy Medium, the gray stallion Pilot Medium. Although only 10 years old, this young sire has his credit Girlfue, 2:28, at 3 years old; Lady Bullion, 2:21, at 4 years old; Sack, 2:19, at 5 years old, and Knight, 2:29. Tackey is certainly one of the most remarkable of that brilliant band of brood mares which call Pilot, Jr., their sire.

A City in Korea. What a wonderful city is Seoul! Its 300,000 people are made up of strange characters, and my eyes have been bobbing about like the rays in a kaleidoscope in my efforts to appreciate it all. Everything is new, and everything new is strange. The big wall which surrounds the city is a wonder, and its three great gates are more wonderful still. They are closed every night at sunset with iron plated doors, and after this time none outside the city can get in, nor can any inside the city get out. As the sun falls behind the mountains which surround the capital a band of soldiers playing music, which sound for all the world like a Scotchman's bag pipes, goes from gate to gate and bars them shut. At the same time watch fires spring up upon the hills in every direction, and from these the king knows that all is well. These watch fires are signals, and they form a part of a continuous line of fires which are built upon the hills in all parts of Korea. They tell by their different flames and their intensity whether all is well along the coasts of the east and west and in the mountains to the north and south. They are, it seemed to me, royalty's farewell word from the day, and they really meant that the country was quiet and the capital might sleep in peace.—Frank G. Carpenter.
