

## FOUND IN TORONTO BAY.

PARTIAL LIGHT THROWN ON A MYS-TERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.

Seymour Porter Drowned but Whether by Accident or Design is not Known-Other Toronto Topics,

TORONTO, April 10. - Toronto Bay gave upanother of its victims yesterday in the body of Seymour Porter who disappeared last New. Year's night, but how he met his death is a mystery and will probably remain one. Deceased was head book keeper for the hardware firm of Rice Lewis & Son with whom he had been connected for 23 years, was widely known in business and financial circles. He was a prominent Mason, about 45 years of age and very popular among his acquaint-ances. The body was discovered at 6.50 yesterday morning by George Sexsmith, who was going to work on the new steam yacht being built for Mr. George Gooderham at the mouth of the Don. It was brought ashore by means of a pole and tied to the wharf until the police had been notified and came with a patrol wagon in which the corpse was removed to the Morgue. By papers found on the body it was identified as that of Mr. Porter; there were also found \$1.25 in silver, an open-faced ladies' gold watch, stopped at 6.05, a bunch of keys and a knife. An inquest was held yesterday afternoon. There was no evidence of foul play and the jury returned a verdict of found drowned. The funeral takes place this afternoon with full Masonic honors. At least a thousand ladies belonging to all parts of the Dominion assembled in the St. James' Square Presbyterian Church yesterday morning to take part in the thirteenth annual meeting of the Presbyterian Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. After devotional services, Mrs. Kellogg gave an address of welcome to the delegates, which was suitably replied to by Mrs. Rodgers, of Deseronto. The morning was taken up with reading the reports of the various committees. The Treasurer's statement was a most satis actory one, showing that in all about \$29,000 has been collected this year. The numerical strength of the society is 14,356.

Charlie Wright, the 9-year-old son of William Wright, 95 Pearl-street, while playing on a raft at the Credit Valley Wharf yesterday morning fell into the bay and was drowned. The body was recovered at 7 o'clock last night.

The \$5,7,587 waterworks bylaw was voted upon in the city yesterday and was carried by 527 majority. The new ward of St. Alban's was the only division that gave a majority against the bylaw, that majority being but 2. Like all other money bylaws that are presented in Toronto little interest was taken in it, only 1259 votes being cast.

W. H. Pearson, jr., superintendent of the Consumers' Gas Company, was united in marriage at St. Philip's Church last night with Annie, the eldest daughter of Mr. James Smith of Chestnut Lodge. Rev. Dr. J. F. Sweeney officiated.

THE CURIOSITY SHOP.

"Shine 'Em Up"—How Boys Put Diamonds on Boots. "Did it ever occur to you," said a chant

"what a remarkable and unique process the blacking of boots is? You see we smear the boot with a preparation of boneblack, which is entirely devoid of luster, and then by the friction of a dry brush make it shine like the sun. There is not another process like this anywhere in the arts, so far as I know, and I never read an where any scientific explanation of the process. I have a theory of my own, however, which I will give you for what it is worth. The key to the mystery lies in the fact that a diamond is nothing but crystallized carbon. The blacking is a little more than carbon paste, and the friction of a hairbrush being one of the most efficient methods of generating electricity, has the effect of crystallizing the carbon of the blacking. As soon as this is done the boot is covered with millions of infinitely small diamonds, and, of course, begins to shine as a mass of diamonds would. Of course, this is not a perfect explanation of the phenomenon. What part the other ingredients of the blacking play, and especially why it is that the blacking must be moistened, I cannot tell."

### The Primitive American.

The environment read from geology indicates that the Trenton man was a bunter or fisherman who used and lost the primitive tools of his mysterious craft within the waters rather than upon the land, and thus appears to materially narrow the range of hypothesis as to his activities; but the extravagance in labor indicated by the vast numbers of unworn implements suggests that the rapid modification in environment and occupation accompanying the ice invasion outran the resulting modification in appliances, and that the implements were really invented on land and were but ill adapted to the new conditions, and the introduction of a new type of implement during the brief epoch of gravel deposition gives support to the suggestion.

So the margin of the cloud enveloping the beginnings of human life in America is slowly lifting. Already there is definite and cumulative evidence of man's existence during the latest ice epoch, with a strong presumption against an earlier origin than the first quaternary ice invasion. Already it is known that the primitive American haunted the ice front rather than the fertile plain, and must have been hunter or fisherman; already his environment is so well known as to partially elucidate his activities, but the first traces of the autochthon yet found tell of an intelligent being who dominated the animal world as does his descendant, and thus the mystery of man's intimate origin even at this late day remains enshrouded as darkly as ever.

### Motes in a Sunbeam.

Counting the dancing motes in a bar of sunlight sounds like one of those hopeless, never ending tasks with which malignant fairies delight to break the spirit of little heroines in the German folk stories. Something more than this, however, has been achieved by modern science, which is now able to count the particles floating in any given portion of the atmosphere and determine what proportion of these are dangerous germs and what are mere dust. Dr. Frankland's curious experiments have shown us how to count the micro-organisms, and now John Aitken, of Falkirk, by a totally different method, has been enabled to take stock of the more harmless but hardly less interesting dust motes. Thirty thousand such particles have been detected by him in the thousandth of a cubic inch of the air of a room. In the outside atmosphere in dry weather the same measurement of air yielded 2,119, whereas, after a heavy rainfall, the number was only 521. That this power of prying into atmospheric secrets will eventually yield very important results must be obvious to all. Among the most curious discoveries already made is the direct and constant relation between dust particles and fogs, mist and rain.

### Men's Follies.

Talk about ladies being devotees to fashion -why, the men are ten times greater slaves than are the gentler sex when it comes to following the lead of some good judges of what is au fait in wearing apparel, and when it comes to their facial adornment the men are like a flock of sheep. Not long since a few of the fashionable young men of St. Louis got a craze for side whiskers. In a very brief period of time every barber in the city had a long list of customers ordering their whiskers "blocked out" on the side. The craze lasted only a few months, and is now gradually fading out entirely. Of course there are a certain number of staid citizens who wear their beards in their own peculiar style, regardless of the provailing fashion, but the younger men-especially society youths-are quickly infected with any new fact in that line. - St. Louis Globe-Domocrat.
