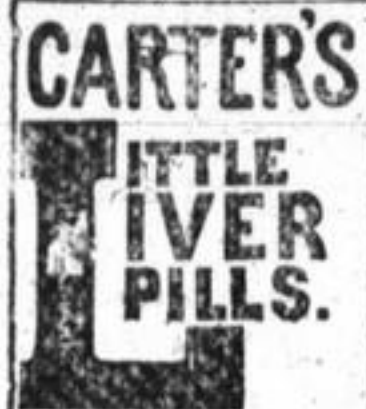

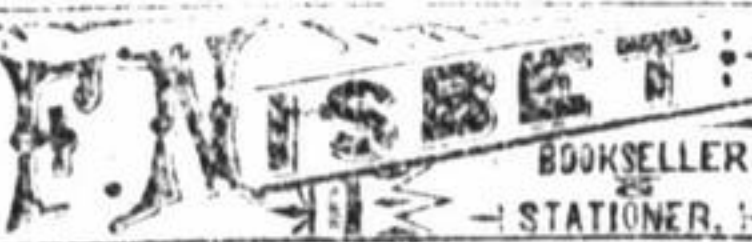

LABBY'S GOSSIP.

He Takes a Radical View of Stanley's Work.—The Aristocrats Again. London, April 11.—It is impossible not to admire Stanley's pluck and endurance, but I venture to question the use of marches like his into the interior of Africa. The plea was that Emin wished to be relieved. He does not want to be relieved. He is only desirous to be left alone. What benefit is it then to the cause of civilization that a white man should hire a vast number of carriers and undertake an expedition in which half of them die of fatigue and some are hanged for wishing to desert in order to force his way through tribes by burning their villages and shooting them? The net result seems to be that it has been discovered that one lake is not so deep as it was 100 years ago, that another lake lies to the south of the first, that there is a very dense forest, mainly inhabited by dwarfs, on the road to these lakes, and that somewhere in the vicinity of this forest there is a high mountain hitherto unknown, the top of which is covered with snow. All this is, no doubt, interesting. But is it worth impressing carriers who die of fatigue or are hanged, and is it worth shooting dwarfs and destroying villages?

I should like to hear the carrier or the dwarf on the question. Prince Alexander of Battenberg having furnished a satisfactory explanation to the Emperor of Austria on the subject of his marriage, which is a perfectly legal one, he has received permission to take up his residence at Gratz, and in the course of a few months will receive a high command in the Austrian army.

The Duchess of Cambridge was the last survivor of the George IV. generation of the royal family, and she was decidedly the most estimable and most talented of them. She will be much lamented by the Queen, who will feel that she has lost one of the few remaining persons who had been about her all her life who really cared for her, and upon whose affection and sympathy she could always rely.

The announcement of Princess Beatrice will take place at Windsor, the event being anticipated in about three weeks. A reliable correspondent at St. Petersburg informs me that the betrothal of the Czarevitch to Princess Anastasia of Montenegro, the third daughter of Prince Nicholas, will be announced at Easter, and my friend adds that the marriage will be very popular in Russia.

The marriage of the Duke of Portland to Miss Dallas Yorke will take place in town the week after Ascot.

The Rose Fenwick is a collapsible or crush bonnet. It was invented by Miss Rose Fenwick, the daughter of an admiral, and is being now taken up by the Paris milliners. HENRY LABOUCHERE.

Had to Take Loose Silver or Nothing.

PHILADELPHIA, April 12.—A prominent citizen of Salem said to-day: "The refusal of the City National Bank of Salem to accept certain terms of exchange offered by the Woodstown National Bank has involved these institutions in a war which has assumed a comical aspect. As the Salem bank receives on deposit daily a large number of the Woodstown Bank checks, a messenger is dispatched to the latter place twice a week, to receive the money for the same. In order to punish the Salem people Cashier Flitcraft, of the Woodstown Bank imported from Philadelphia thousands of dollars in silver coin, counted out in bags, to meet these checks. Messenger Powell, whom the Salem bank sent down last week, protested against being paid with silver. Yesterday, when Powell appeared with \$1800 in checks Flitcraft wheeled out the money in a wheelbarrow to the middle of the bank and dumped it loose on the floor, compelling Powell to count out the entire amount. When bags were asked for in which to carry the money to Salem, Cashier Flitcraft politely responded that "banks were not in the habit of furnishing their patrons with purses." The war continues and is the topic of conversation of the citizens of the two counties."

A Village Wiped Out by Flames.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., April 12.—The village of Canonsburg, 16 miles northeast of this city was almost swept out of existence by fire yesterday. The fire started in John Thomas' Hotel. Men, women and children carried water or did what they could to remove property from the reach of the flames. Feather beds, blankets and carpets soaked with water were hung from the eaves and on the roofs of threatened houses and by heroic efforts the fire was finally subdued. Thomas' Hotel was entirely destroyed, loss \$8000, the grocery store, owned by George Hartwell, was burned, loss \$3000; general store of drugs, groceries, etc., owned by Dr. J. C. Benbow was destroyed and his barn and dwelling also burned, loss \$3000. Many other buildings including a grist mill and Joyce's Hotel were slightly damaged. Most of the destroyed property was partially insured.

Murdered at a Beer Party.

WEST BRANCH, Mich., April 12.—At an evening beer party at the residence of Stephen Weigers in Eduardo Township Frank Buhlman was struck on the head with a heavy stick of stove-wood by Steve Kartes. Buhlman died about four hours afterwards. Steve Kartes and his brother Peter, who was also fighting with Buhlman, have been arrested, and Coroner Cochrane is holding an inquest. Great excitement prevails over the matter.

Killed in a Fight.

BUFFALO, April 12.—Daniel O'Connell, 50 years of age, boarding on Carroll-street, got into a fight Wednesday night at the corner of Seventh and Massachusetts streets. He was terribly bruised up and when the fight was over O'Connell was found lying on the sidewalk in an unconscious condition. He was taken to the Emergency Hospital, thence being removed yesterday morning to the Sisters' Hospital, where he died at 12.30 yesterday afternoon.

The C. P. R.'s Detroit Extension.

WINDSOR, April 12.—The Canadian Pacific Railroad Company put 100 extra men at work on the Windsor end of the line yesterday morning and also large forces to work all along the line. The slip dock of the company will run to the edge of the channel, further than the slips of either of the present companies.

High License in Mississippi. JACKSON, Miss., April 11.—Jackson, after being dry nearly 2 1/2 years, is again a wet town. The first saloon opened yesterday opened under the local option law, to be followed by half a dozen more. The city council fixed the license at \$2000.
