Unless all signs fail this promises to be a great baseball year. There is more interest in baseball than ever before.

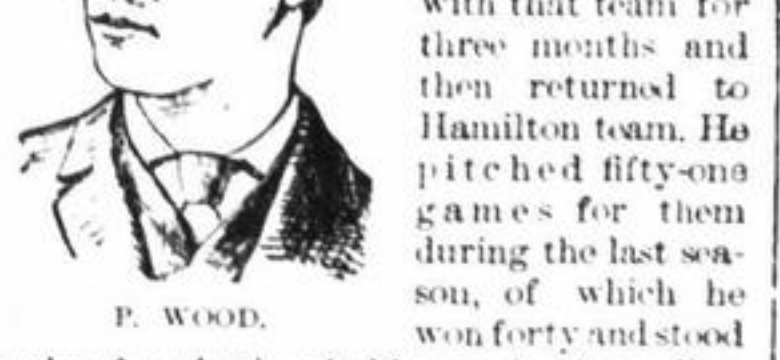
Why? Its easy enough to see why. The globe trotters did it.

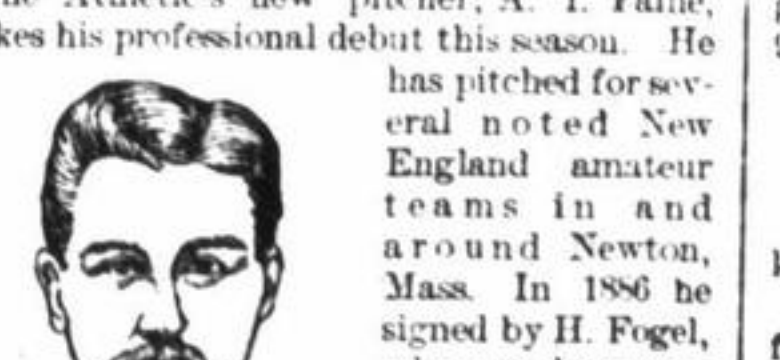


number four in the pitching rank. According to The Philadelphia Times he is a good steady pitcher, has excellent command of the ball and uses good judgment in the variation of pace.



The Macon (Ga.) team, of the Southern League, then acquired his services, and his release was bought by Detroit in June, 1888.

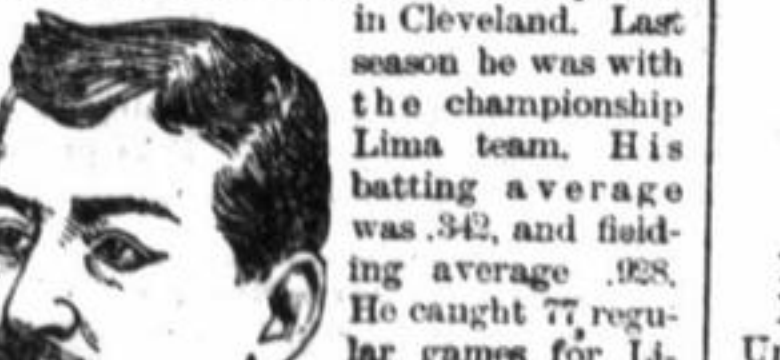

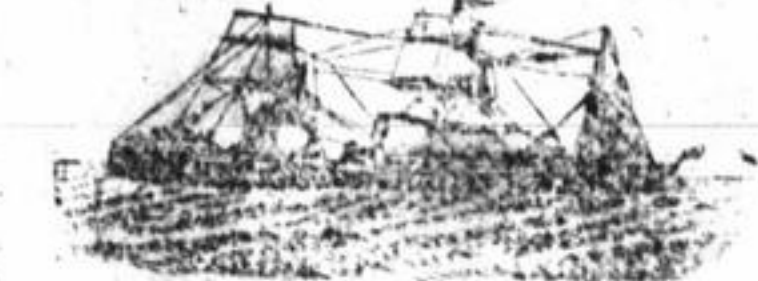
