THE MORRISON CAPTURE.

Those composing the expedition in search of Morrison, the Megantic murderer, have returned to Montreal, the capture of Morrison settling the disturbance. Had he stood for trial he might have long since been a free man. That is assuming that the circumstances of the murder are as they have been reported by the press. Morrison had been made desperate by adversity. His father had been induced to endorse for one who took advantage of the fact that he could not read and inserted a fraudulent entry in the note. Donald sought to hold to the estate, in which he had invested \$750 in cash, but had to let it go after he had sunk \$700 fruitlessly in law. Then he committed some offence in connection with which a warrant was issued for his arrest and entrusted for execution to one Warren, "an American whiskey smuggler and escaped convict," who threatened to shoot Morrison down in his tracks. When they met Morrison advised Warren to keep away, but Warren pulled his revolver and began to un-sheath it. Then Morrison pulled out his weapon and calling out to his friends, "Fair play is bonnie play; my life is as dear to me as his is to him," took aim and fired. Warren was shot dead. It has been remarked as singular that the people of Megantic should sympathize as they do with the murderer. Well, they do not regard him as a great criminal; they rather look upon him as a persecuted man, one whose crime admits of palliation. They think that if he gave himself up he would escape conviction. He thought so himself, and several times essayed to surrender, but his courage always failed him, and hence the agitation which continues in Megantic with the apparently unparalleled defiance of law and justice.

A SHAMEFUL POLICY.

The policy of the dominion government in so far as it concerns the liquor traffic is beyond comprehension. In the North-West, for obvious reasons, prohibition is supposed to be in force, but the law has been more respected in the breach than the observance. At various times and under the regime of various officials liquor has been imported in large quantities and consumed, to the detriment of the people's morals. The reign of Lieut. Governor Royal, however, appears to be attended with particular disaster to the prohibition cause. Permits have been issued indiscriminately to those desiring to take liquor into the territories, and such is the disregard of regulations supposed to be in force, that Mr. Fisher, the old time champion of temperance, brought the matter before the commons in order to ascertain what the house thought of it. And the action of the government and its supporters has been a great surprise. The position was taken—so extraordinary in view of the ruling in the Letellier case—that the lieutenant-governor of the North West territories was absolutely master of the situation, that there could be no dictation from Ottawa. A great wrong was thus committed. The Ottawa Journal, a good conservative paper, protests against this decision, declaring: "The Northwest act declares that the lieutenant-governor shall administer the affairs of the territories in accordance with instructions from the federal government, and if he does not carry out the policy of his superiors he can be dismissed. Mr. Letellier was removed from the lieutenant-governorship of Quebec for a far less serious offence than that committed by Mr. Royal, but no doubt the latter feels safe because he is simply carrying out the secret policy of his superiors."

The Witness goes further and intimates that Mr. Royal was appointed because of his anti-temperance ideas, that he was given his appointment for the very purpose of instituting a liquor shop propaganda for the conservative party in the territories. Moreover, it says Mr. Royal is merely the servant of the government appointing him, and it is responsible for all his acts. Then it adds: "It is incredible that men should all believe exactly as their party leaders do on all questions. It is especially impossible that all the rank and file of the conservative party should have conscientiously thought that the government was right in legalizing the liquor course throughout the Northwest. Yet, with one noble exception, every man of them has bowed down at the feet of the party idol and given a most contemptible vote for its sake. Most painful of all is to see the vacillation of Mr. Foster, once the bold and eloquent leader of the prohibition movement. His was the old choice between principle and worldly position. All these things are things if thou wilt bow down and worship me. He would not publicly kneel, but he could not give up all for what he knew to be right."

Mr. Foster is not even manly in his desertion of principle. He could not check it and sit in the house and oppose his old friend, Mr. Fisher. He went into the corridor and dodged the division on the ground that he had paired with Mr. Charlton. And what did that mean? That had he not been paired he would have voted against prohibition! What a tumble in the public's estimation this politicians has taken, to be sure!

What Our New Railway Neighbors Have to Tell Us. April 23.—Fall grain looks well and the warm rain of Friday night will do an immensity of good to pastures. The surveyors on N. T. & Q. R.R. have been here all week getting the line ready for the contractor to begin work, which will be May 1st. The right of way has been bought here from J. A. Shibley, C. Babcock, A. Scott and J.
