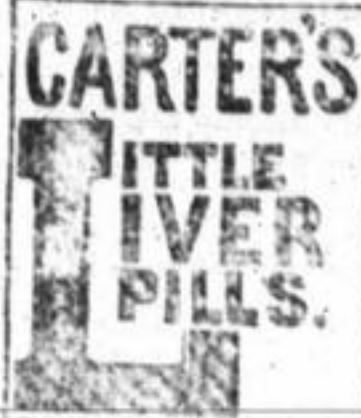

TORONTO TOPICS

The Christian Unity Conference - The Queen City's Population.

Toronto, April 26.—The Christian Unity conference which began Wednesday was concluded yesterday, representatives from the Methodist, Anglican and Presbyterian churches being present. Rev. Dr. McMullen, moderator of the General Assembly, occupied the chair. The committee appointed on Wednesday prescribe these subjects for discussion: (1) Corporate unity, (2) unity in doctrine, worship and mode of administration of the sacrament, (3) Holy Scriptures; (4) creeds, (5) one condition of administration of the sacrament, (6) the historic episcopate. The committee also stated: "That in our best judgment the objects of the gathering will be more effectually furthered after disposing of the subject of corporate unity by taking up in the first instance the second topic. The publication of these points of agreement will have the effect of turning the minds of the church to this matter and will have the effect of fostering a desire for unity, also strengthening the faith in the ultimate accomplishment of unity according to the mind of Christ. In the cordial growth of this desire and this faith our hope of a happy ultimate issue can only depend." At the evening session a resolution was passed, trusting that similar conferences may continue to be held from time to time, undertaking to recommend to the several churches the appointment of delegations for that purpose.

An official census of St. Alban's ward (Parkdale) taken yesterday shows the population of the flowery annex to be 5651, which added to the population of the other twelve wards as shown by the census of Dec. 15 makes the total population of Toronto 172,460.

After the hearing of considerable evidence in the cause celebre of Brennan v. Brennan, mention of which was made in this correspondence yesterday, it was arranged out of court that the parties should live apart, that Mrs. Brennan should maintain herself and have the custody of the child; and that she be allowed \$3 a week for the maintenance of the child till it is ten years of age, and \$4 a week after that.

THE MANITOBA RAILROAD.

Sir George Stephen and Sir Donald Smith Elected Directors.

New York, April 25.—At a meeting of the Manitoba Railroad directors here today, Sir George Stephen and Sir Donald Smith were elected directors. At the office of the company much secrecy was observed and the names of the retiring directors were refused. It is stated, however, that the \$8,000,000 of Manitoba stock, which was bought by interests identified with the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy two years ago, has been resold to its original holders. The two new directors were in the Manitoba board when the sale of this stock occurred, but retired to make room for the representatives of the purchasers in August 1887.

Northern Pacific Meeting.

New York, April 25.—At the special meeting of the Northern Pacific Railway directors today the resolution agreeing to the arbitration contract for the control and harmonious operation of the roads in the Pacific Northwest was rescinded. This ends the scheme to obtain a guarantee of the dividend on the Oregon Navigation stock from the Northern Pacific jointly with the Union Pacific, and throws the burden of the lease on the Union Pacific. The proposition to operate the Wisconsin Central on a percentage of earnings was discussed, and three forms of proposed contracts were presented. Only one was read, after which the board adjourned to meet again next Thursday. After the adjournment it was announced that Brayton Ives, one of the most active members of the Northern Pacific board, resigned his office of Vice-President of the Oregon Transcontinental Company, to take effect May 1. This is understood to indicate that the relations of the old Northern Pacific directors with Villard have been severed and it is expected that the representative of the Oregon Transcontinental will withdraw from the Northern Pacific directors.

A CHLOROFORM CASE.

John Dean of Waterford Suing for Damages Because of the Death of His Wife.

HAMILTON, April 25.—At the Assizes today the trial of the chloroform case, Dean v. Rose, was commenced. It is likely to last several days. The facts are briefly as follows: John Dean is a young liveryman, residing at Waterford, a village on the Canada Southern railway, southwest of Brantford. On January 25 last his wife, a young lady about 23 years of age, went to W. J. Chambers, a dentist in the village, to get some teeth pulled. It became necessary for her to take chloroform, and Dr. Rose, the defendant, was called in. Chloroform was administered in the usual way and as a result Mrs. Dean died, despite all efforts to resuscitate her. The plaintiff's counsel tried to show that chloroform was administered by the defendant after another physician had advised her not to take it, but to take a stimulant; that he gave it improperly, and that after she showed signs of death by a livid countenance, etc., they went on giving her the anesthetic; also that they had not the proper appliances ready to resuscitate her.

Yesterday nineteen tavern and saloon keepers were notified by letter that their licenses would not be renewed.

Said a prominent gentleman to-day: "I have it on excellent authority that the Grand Trunk is going to take over the Niagara Central Railway, and is at present buying timber to be used in constructing the balance of the road from Thorold to the beach."

E. R. Kent died suddenly yesterday afternoon. He was well known in business circles, having started the Burlington Glassworks and the Canada Glasshouse. Deceased was 61 years of age.

A C.P.R. DEPOT BURNT.

Disastrous Fire at Stanbridge—Two Hotels Destroyed—A \$25,000 Loss.

ST. ALBAN'S, Vt., April 25.—Stanbridge, P.Q., just across the Canadian line, was visited by a disastrous fire about 2.30 this morning, resulting in the destruction of the Canadian Pacific Railroad depot, freight house, engine house, one engine, two passenger cars and eight freight cars, most of which were loaded. Seneger's large general store, two hotels and several houses were also burnt. The fire originated in the railroad woodshed, and as the village is without a fire department, the buildings were at the mercy of the flames. Loss probably \$25,000. Seneger's store was a new one, and insured for \$8000. The insurance on both hotels is \$7000.

A Mexican Revolt.

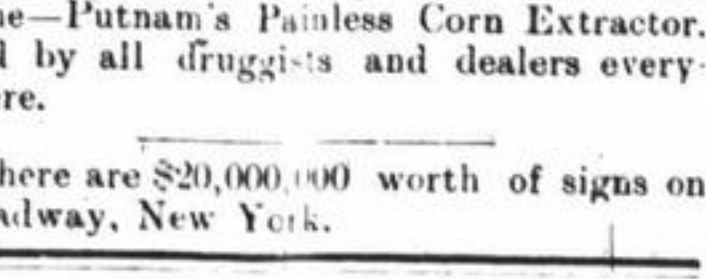
MEXICO, April 25.—Troops have been sent to quell a religious uprising at La Luz in the State of Guanajuato.

- A Tile Sewer on Division Street, between Victoria Street and Brock Street, inside area to be 113 square inches.
Also a Tile Sewer on Montreal Street between James Street and Markland Street, inside area to be 225 square inches.
Also a Tile Sewer on John Street, between Patrick Street and Montreal Street, inside area to be 113 square inches.
Also a Tile Sewer in Charles Street, between Patrick Street and Montreal Street, inside area to be 113 square inches, and for assessing and levying the cost thereof on the real properties immediately benefitted thereby, as shown by the report of the City Engineer now on file in his office, unless the majority of the owners of such real properties, representing at least one half in value thereof, petition the said Council against such assessment within one month after the last publication of this notice, which will be on the 4th day of May, 1889.

The estimated cost of the Sewer on Division Street is \$1,500, and the part of this to be provided by the Council is estimated to be \$215.

The estimated cost of the Sewer on Montreal Street is \$600, and the part of this to be provided by the Council is estimated to be \$50.

The estimated cost of the Sewer on John Street is \$450, and the part of this to be provided by the Council is estimated to be \$22.

The estimated cost of the Sewer on Charles Street is \$420, and the part of this to be provided by the Council is estimated to be \$22.

N.B.—Any leaseholder, the term of whose lease (including any renewals therein provided for) is not less than twenty-one years, if he has in the said lease consented to pay all Municipal taxes during the term of said lease, is an owner for the purpose of signing such petition.
