OLD LAND RENTS.

Not until a government had made an enquiry into the rent question and exercised the powers that were given to them by parliament of adjusting the rates to suit the cases brought before them, did the extortion of some of the landlords become apparent. And just in the same way, not until a commission, appointed by special act of the imperial parliament and working under special instructions, had sent in their report was the fact made clear that in Scotland rent exactions of the landlords had been productive of indescribable poverty. Some idea of the absolute robbery practiced upon the Crofters may be surmised when it is stated that they have had their rents reduced by 51 per cent., those of Orkney by 30 per cent., of Rose I and Cromarty by 43 per cent., of Inverness. shire by 31 per cent., of Sutherland by 13 per cent., making the average of fair rents fixed 291 per cent. The average of arrears cancelled is 68 per cent. -74 per cent. in Caithness, 55 in Orkney, 59 in Inverness, 74 in Ross and Cromarty, and 31 in Suther. land. How did the tenants manage to live? By sacrifices such as are unknown by even the very poor of Canada. English pictorial papers have given representations of the Crofters' mode of living, but no artist's pen or pencil can pourtray the sufferings which these people endured during the time they were forced to pay scandalous tribute to the land owners. They had to remain in Scotland-they couldn't move away or emigrate without means -and laboured on for a miserable existence while the landlords lived in luxury abroad. The Standing of the Anglican Churches at Napanee, Gananoque and Deseronto.

St. Mark's, Deseronto. - The financial report showed the total receipts for the year to have been \$3,400. George Field was appointed rector's warden, and W. Evans was appointed people's warden. The other officers elected are: Secretary-treasurer, Edward Wilson with J. F. Chapman as assistant; organist, E. A. Rixen; assistant organist, Miss Field; choir master, H. C. Fowkes; lay delegate to synod, E. A. Rixen; sidesmen, Messrs. J. F. Chapman, Joseph Hoppes, James Sexsmith and Thos. J. Naylor.

Christ church, Gananoque. - The churchwardens presented their report, the best financial showing in the history of the church. The amount received during the year through open offertory was \$337.85, through envelopes \$789.98, and from other sources \$307.16. After paying expenses there was a balance on hand of \$33.38. The rector re-appointed John Finucan his churchwarden, and A. Davis was the choice for people's warden. George Jackson and J. C. Ross re-appointed auditors. Mr. Ross was re-appointed delegate to the synod. St. Mary Magdalene's, Napanee. - Mr.

Ruttan read the financial statement. It showed that outstanding liabilities had all been paid, new furnaces put into the church, and the debt reduced to \$6,597.51. The loan had been readjusted at 5 per cent., a new bond having been given, with the option of making payments in reduction of £25 at a time. There still was a deficit of \$279 for various obligations, including the stipend of the clergyman, but there were promised subscriptions and cash available to about \$149 as a set off. Fred. Bartlett was proposed as warden for the congregation and elected. Walter Gurren was nominated as clergy. man's warden. The following were elected sidesmen: Messrs. Judge Wilkison, A. T. Harshaw, R. G. Wright, Dr. Cook, J. Wallace, James E. Herring and G. F. Ruttan. General discussion arose as to the advantages of the existing free seat system. Finally it was decided to adjourn to May 6th, Mr. Fessenden giving notice of a resolution to change the present system. The retiring delegate to the diocesan synod R G. Wright was re elected for three years.
