THE CENTENNIAL OPENED.

New York Arrived in Bunting and Thronged with Multitudes.
NEW YORK, April 29.—Today began the joyous celebration of the centennial festivities. Never before in the history of the country has there been such a display of flags and bunting as that which greeted the citizens this morning. The arrangements for the naval parade were carried out to the letter. The spectacle along the river front was a beautiful one, the long procession of steamers being impressive. Following the example of the illustrious Washington, President Harrison was rowed ashore in a barge. As he stepped out of the boat the Presidential salute of 21 guns was given. The President was received by Governor Hill, Mayor Grant, Hamilton Fish, President of the Centennial Committee, and W. G. Hamilton, Chairman of the Committee on States. The line of march was directly up Wall-street to the Equitable Life Building, via Broadway, and from there to the City Hall via Broadway.

When the President and his party reached the Broadway entrance to the Equitable building the guard of troops under Major MacCrea moved into the grand court of the building, followed by the New York commanders of the Loyal Legion under Col. Church and the G.A.R. commanders under Col. Walton. Upon the entrance of the President the troops presented arms and the full choir of Trinity Church, led by Dr. Messier, descended the main staircase, which had been laid with a velvet carpet. The hymn "Before the Lord We Bow" was chanted and followed by the doxology, accompanied by a full corps of trumpeters. The President and his party then ascended by the elevators to the suite of rooms occupied by the Lawyers' Club on the fifth floor. Mr. Hamilton introduced President Harrison to the President of the club, W. Allen Butler, jr., and others. Mr. Butler conducted the President to his seat on the dais in the reception room and Secretary Borrowes followed with Vice-President Morton.

The Floor Committee conducted the governors of the states and territories, i. e. the order of admission to the Union or formation, to places on each side of the President's position. The Floor Committee was presented to the President in a body and then the guests of the club entered two by two, passed through the reception room bowing to the President and out to the dining room. There was no handshaking, and the dignity and formality of Colonial receptions were observed. The President and his party were then conducted to the private dining hall of the Cafe Savarin on the third floor. Here exquisite taste had been displayed in the decorations of the table. As the President entered the lights flashed brightly, presenting a fairy-like scene of beauty. Covers were laid for 50 guests. The other guests were served with luncheon in the Club dining-room and at a huge buffet.

When the party were seated, Wm. G. Hamilton, the great-grandson of Alexander Hamilton, addressed President Harrison in a neat speech. President Harrison merely bowed in recognition of the remarks. The reception and lunch at the Equitable building were scheduled to end at 3.30 p.m., and ten minutes later to the air "Hail to the Chief" by Cappa's band, President Harrison emerged from the massive granite portals and again entered his carriage for the journey to the City Hall. As the various organizations arrived at the City Hall they drew up in line before it. From the foot of the marble stairs leading to the municipal building and stretching away into the rotunda was a double line of white clad public school and normal college girls, each with a basket of flowers from which they strewed the path of the distinguished personages. There were fully 200 scholars, among them being two colored girls. Arrived at the top of the stairs President Harrison was tendered an address of welcome delivered by Miss Anna Abrahams, at the conclusion of which he was given a monster bouquet of LaFrance roses.

President Harrison, arm in arm with Mayor Grant, Governor Hill with Hamilton Fish, Vice-President Morton and Commodore Gerry and three members of the Plan and Scope Committee then entered the City Hall. The distinguished party were escorted to the Governor's room, where the President began receiving the visitors. He stood on a slightly raised platform, which was decked with a brass railing and in the rear of which was the President's chair. Beside this was Washington's writing desk. President Harrison took his position on the right hand side with Vice-President Morton, Governor Hill and Mayor Grant beside him to the left in the order named.

The throng of people was at once admitted and came on in a steadily moving body for nearly an hour. President Harrison bowed to each couple that passed. The throng was largely made up of strangers in the city, a fact which was too patent in many instances. The sexes were about equally represented. At 4.55 the President returned to his carriage, and with the Vice-President, the Governor and Commodore Gerry, was driven to Mr. Morton's residence under the same escort that attended him from the Equitable building. Daffening cheers went up as he was being driven away.

The grand centennial ball took place at the Metropolitan Opera House to-night. All that money and keen sense of patriotism could do to carry out the immense scheme that was to give a night of pleasure to 6000 people was done. The result attained was highly satisfactory.
