

ALL AROUND THE HOUSE.

The "Marine" Curtain-A New and Charming Bit of Decorative Furnishing

A novel and very charming curtain is a "marine" of sea green satin with large fish appliqued on it. These fish are made of gold and silver gauze over red and gray silk respectively. Some have velvet heads and beaded eyes, and all-have scales worked in silk. Over the sea groun foundation two nets of fine string are artistically draped, one dark brown, the other of a reddish-tone. These bang from a thick silk cord fastened to each end of the curtain rod, carried right across down each side, threaded through the nets and knotted at intervals. . The nets are wide, and are caught up into graceful folds, leaving the foundation exposed in places.

Imprisoned in the meshes of various spoils of the deep, pink and gray plush starfish, delicately tinted anemones fringed with silk, crabs and fish of several kinds; bunches of many colored sea weeds, made of narrow ribbons are caught here and there; a quantity of glass drops are fastened on the net to heighten the effect. This idea could be utilized in many ways for smaller pieces; it would make a pretty and cool looking decoration for a fire grate in the hot weather.

Fish Baked with Wine.

. An excellent way to serve fish is to bake it with wine, and for this the following is Mrs. Henderson's recipe; Soak some bread inwater, squeeze it dry and add an egg well beaten. Season with pepper, salt and a little parsley or thyme. Stuff the fish with this dressing. Crease the baking pan (one just right size f r holding the fish) with butter; season the fish on top and put it in the pan with about two cups of boiling water; baste it well, adding more boiling water when necessary. About twenty minutes before serving pour over it a cup of sour wine and a small piece of butter; put half a lemon sliced into the gravy; baste the fish well again. When it is thoroughly baked remove it from the pan; garnish the top with the slices of lemon; finish the sauce in the baking dish by adding a little butter rubbed to a paste in some flour; strain, skim, and serve in a sauce

A Bedspread in White and Gold.

Coarse linen sheeting makes an effective bedspread, with a bold design of large lilies and leaves applied on it in gold colored sateen, worked with silk of two shades of gold deeper than the sateen. The design is traced on the sateen, tacked on the sheeting and chain stitched around the outlines; then, when the edges are cut away, the design stands out on the surface and is finished off with long, "spiky" stitches. The veining of the leaves, etc., is done in long stitch. A broad band of gold colored sateen is added as a border allaround. A heavy counterpane may be of coarse brown blanketing or of serge, with very large poppies and leaves or sunflowers or some large design worked in worsteds. The work is easy and pleasant.

Russian Mode of Cleaning Furs.

Fur garments should always be clean when packed away, and now that the season for storing them for the summer is at hand, the following description, by a foreign journal, of now furs are cleaned and renovated in Russia-the land of furs-is interesting: Some rye flour is put into a pot and heated upon a stove, with constant stirring as long as the hand can bear the heat. The flour is then spread over the fur and rubbed into it. After this the fur is brushed with a very clean brush, or, better, is gently beaten until all the flour is removed. The fur thus resumes its natural luster and appears absolutely as if

To Waterproof Hammocks.

Hammocks that are allowed to hang out most of the time are soon rotted by the action of the weather. It is said that they may be made "waterproof" by immersing in boiling linseed oil, and leaving them in it for a day or two. Then with a cloth rub off all the oil possible, and when the netting is dried it will last much longer than it otherwise would.

To Clear a Waste Pipe.

A plumber's advice for clearing a clogged pipe is to pour in at night enough liquid soda lye to fill the "trap" or beat part of the pipe, and to prevent water running in it till next morning. During the night the lye will probably convert the obstruction into soft soap and the first current of water will wash

Broiled Oysters.

Make as many nice slices of buttered, toast as there are persons to serve; allow half a dozen oysters for each one; dip the oysters in melted butter, lay them between the bars of a fine wire gridiron, and broil them over a hot fire until their edges curl, dust them with pepper, and serve them on the toast.

FLOWER BASKET. This basket, for fruit as well as flowers, is mounted in silk brocade. Some beautiful baskets are merely flower trimmed, but filled with bonbons. Most of these elegant baskets and stands can be converted into receptacles for needlework materials and utensils, when the flowers have faded or the sweets have been consumed, by removing the tin linings which protect the rich materials from being soiled. All these attractive novelties represent most fitting and favored Easter gifts.
