A CHANGE OF BASE. The Empire had it first that the Compton election decided the anti-Jesuit agitation, that it determined the attitude of a largely Protestant constituency against the dominion's interference with provincial rights, that the lesson of the Quebecers to the Ontarians was significant and worth remembering. Now our contemporary has made a new discovery, namely that in the Compton election, the one great question which was brought to the front in this contest was the choice between the national policy and 'unrestricted reciprocity, with its corollary whether our country should remain Canadian and British or be Americanized. At the nomination the burden of all the speeches was arguments and appeals in favour of one or the other respectively of these rival courses as the great point to be decided by the verdict of the electors." No. At the nomination the freer trade relations between the United States and Canada were discussed, but to no purpose. No man, however, stood up in favour of any disloyal act, and it is a fiction or a fib to say to the contrary. The disposition of the party leaders was to discuss some of the issues of the day, and especially the fiscal policy of the govern ment, but the people were bent, it seems, upon paying tribute to their dead represen tative through the homage to his son. It was a personal contest throughout, and it resulted just as it was expected to do, in the return of Mr. Rufus l'ope, who possesses many of the traits of his father and whose standing with the electors was very popular. As a matter of truth the election was devoid of political importance, and certainly had no special identification with the trade question or any of its corollaries. The Empire has been preaching great sermons, but in every case the text has been a figment of the brain.

REASON TO BE MAD.

We learn from the Ottawa Free Press that Sir Charles Tupper, during his recent visit to Ottawa, spoke disparagingly of the action of the government in discussing the 3 per cent. loan. He said the government could not escape their liability to invest the whole of the sinking funds in buying up the bonds and Mr. Foster's pretension that the promise contained in the prospectus can be repudiated by the government because it is not embodied in the bonds is impossible. Sir Charles had been a party to the issuing ofthe prospectus promising that the government sinking funds would be devoted to the re-purchase of the bonds, and had given private assurances to intending purchasers, and on the strength of these pledges, made on behalf of the government, the 3 per cent. bonds were taken up at good prices. The government's declaration that they are not bound to carry out the conditions mentioned in the prospectus Sir Charles regards as a serious reflection upon his own course, and it will place him in a ri-liculous position before the London capitalists. Mr. Foster did not worry over this during the debate: He was concerned about how to miminize the effect of Sir Richard Cartwright's motion and he took the methods that weakened him as a financier and political leader. It was the greatest folly to say that the terms of a loan had to be lived up to whether these terms were made by the minister of finance or any of his agents. If Mr. Foster did not know them-and the first enquiries of the house established that fact-the more discredit to him, and he has not added to the standing of himself or his government by preaching repudiation. Sir Charles Tupper helped him out of one scrape, but he has been rewarded in such a way as to put any future appeal out of the question.

GOV. HILL'S VETO.

The vetoing by Governor Hill, of New York, of the ballot reform bill creates a chilling surprise. For many years the honest electorate have been crying out for a law which will check the bribery so rampant in all elections, and especially those of the state and the nation. The ballot has been in use, but, marked and deposited, it has not had a check upon the abuses practiced at the polls. Votes have been bought quite freely and virtually cast by the purchasers, since they supplied, by the abominable system that prevailed, duplicates of the ballots and had them used. It was not without a vigorous battle in the legislature that the Australian method of voting by ballot was adepted. It is esteemed the most perfect in the world, that is in the isolation of the voter in the polling booth and the absolute secrecy with which he marks his ballot. With such a system in force greater political purity was hoped for, and the legisla-

ture having so strongly endorsed it the eb-

struction of the governor was not looked for. And when he vetoed the measure great was the astonishment. That he used the veto unwisely appears to every one who knows of the present corruptive influences of political parties, and of the increase of these as the wealth and power of the parties increase. Democracy has received a blow, for if it means anything it is the recognition of the people's voice in the selection of leaders who will reflect their opinion and rule as they desire. The vetoing of a law for which there was great necessity places Governor Hill in the attitude of a sympathiser with those who are given to the worst forms of political impurity. If he is not in league with the bribers and the heelers he has certainly done that which will command their admiration. His future political glory may be left safely in the hands of the lawbreakers than the law-makers, but it is not usually so.


