

London, Feb. 17.—The government's bill, affecting the land laws, will relate only to Ireland, though Mr. Gladstone is understood to have intimated private. ly that if the results prove tavorable in Ireland he sees no objection to applying UITECT Ireland he sees no objection to applying the same principle in Wales. 
