THE GENERAL HOSPITAL.

THE HOSPITAL STeward AND THE STATE-

MENT HE SENDS TO THE PRESS.

The "Whig" Perfectly Candid in its Course

It was asked that the Whig should be

Discharged from Hospital, "A Sensation,"

etc., with reference to which I

would like to mention a few solid facts.

You say that on Saturday last Governor

Duff visited the hospital and ordered

the attending medical officer to expel

eight old decrepit persons, who had

no alternative in the case of discharge

but starvation or the goal.

Now, sir, this is not so. Mr. Duff

simply said to Dr. Dupuis, in reference

to an old man aged 84 years, admitted

to the institution by the name of "John

Smith," that he was not a fit subject for

hospital treatment, and ought not to

have been admitted, who having been

born down by the priest at Brewer's

Mills for admission to the House of

Providence. Dr. Dupuis then said that

there were several inmates at present in

the hospital who were incurable and

ought not to be there, and Governor

Duff then added that if such were the

case he did not care to carry out the

rule, which reads as follows:

"Section 85. No patient laboring un-

der insanity, except for a few days, or

under any disease which is incurable or

incapable of palliation, shall be admit-

ted into the hospital, nor shall any one

be admitted whose case and circum-

stances do not positively require it, nor

shall any patient be retained in the

hospital when his disease shall be cured

or alleviated so far as from the nature

thereof may be practicable."

Dr. Dupuis certainly did ask what

was the case of them, but Mr. Duff

did not give the answer attributed to

him in your paragraph, nor did I hear

him use any words that implied any

kind of the kind.
