Sir. your opposition was not really of the Order of which I still prefer to think you a true and worthy brother. Give the matter your mature consideration. Ask the opinion of any Orangeman you meet (I know now the views of hundreds on this question) and I am sure you will come forward like a man and always thought of you, as differing from the "political Orangeman" in being the faithful friend of the Orange Order.


