MACKENZIE'S LETTER. TO JOHN GASKIN, GRETCHING-BRECHER, MADE ON THE 17TH OF JULY. appears I differ from you in being an Orangeman first and a Conservative afterwards. I declined to follow a party whose conservatism, as represented by Sir John Macdonald's government, means subordination to the French Ultramarine party and the subsidizing of Roman Catholic Quebec at the cost of Protestant Ontario. In connection with this stand I ask you to think over the history of the Orange Incorporation of the Orange Order, which was the result of the rebellion of the O'Donoghue letter, etc., etc. Ask yourself if the leader may not be false to his cause and yet a follower he true to it. Compare small things with great and consider the noble conduct of John Bright in refusing to follow Gladstone when he thought Gladstone wrong. You know more about my political position than any other Orangeman. You know that I required nothing directly, nothing indirectly from any man or party, and that I had no need the support of Orangemen for any place or office. You heard me, on the 12th of July, stand up for the liberty of a few helpless Orangemen before a great many independent Orangemen, and yet you not only opposed me but insisted that I had some sinister design in view. Perhaps it did not strike you that the case of the penitentiary guards involved a grand principle—the question of the honor, the independence and the welfare of the Orange Order. You did not see the "thin edge of the wedge," and that before the next 12th of July an order may be issued prohibiting all Dominion government officials, including even the Provincial Grand Master of Ontario East, from taking part in the celebration of a victory that established Protestant freedom in Great Britain and her colonies. Sir, your opposition was not really against me. It was against the dignity of the Order, of which I still prefer to think not a true, but a worthy brother. Give the matter your mature consideration. Ask the opinion of any Orangeman you meet (I know now the views of hundreds on this question) and I am sure you will come forward like a man and say, "Bro. Mackenzie was right; his position is impragnable." I will then have occasion to think of you, as I have always thought of you, as differing from the "political Orangeman" in being the faithful friend of the Orange Order. In conclusion let me explain that Bro. George Purdy, of Portland, who rode one of my horses on the 12th, had some affairs to attend to before going to his home by the K. & P. R., and I was obliged to accompany him to my house sooner than I expected. I regretted the flow of eloquence that burst forth after my departure from the clerical gentleman of Ottawa, who (to borrow his own expression) enunciated some "queer doctrines; from that well known C. A. Herman, John McIntyre, who, after navigating on the sidewalk during the procession, went to sea with the "Invincible Armada;" and from the brother from Prescott who knows all about "hears." Did he know anything about the report of the Frenchmen in British uniform at St. John, P.Q., who are said to have executed the new military manoeuvre of presenting arms in a kneeling position? That question should interest him, as he is reported to have approved of men "praying in their own way" and "rotating axes." I suppose even in the gutter. But enough of these worthy brethren. You can consider this communication as being in the form of an open letter, and prepare your answer accordingly. Paragraphs of Interest to Those who Labor on the Rolling Deep. The schr. W. R. Taylor is lying here in ordinary. The schr. Riverside, from Chicago to Kingston with corn, is in the Welland Canal. The mail boat yesterday morning ran into the wharf at Brockville and tore away a part of it. Capt. Miller, of the schr. Cameron, had to retire because of ill health. He arrived in the city today. The steamer yacht Annie Laurie, owned by S. B. Hancock, now makes daily trips between Alexandria Bay and Kingston. Three hundred pieces of timber were discharged from the schr. W. R. Taylor yesterday, at Garden Island, in five hours. The steamer barge D. D. Calvin and the schr. Bavaria and Prussia arrived at Garden Island today. They have timber cargoes from Cheboygan. R. Crawford, a local dealer, has completed his contract for the delivery of 1,400 tons of coal at the penitentiary. The schr. Julia arrived yesterday with the last cargo. The schr. W. R. Taylor, (Capt. James Dill), went to Cheboygan to load timber and returned to Garden Island in twenty-six days. The distance covered was 700 miles. The tonnage dues on Canadian vessels entering American ports are three cents registered tonnage and seven days ago did a fog. A hole was knocked in her side. She was headed for Amherstburg, but before she reached the place she sank. She was insured, and was owned by Mr. Ghisholm, St. Catharines. She has since been towed to Detroit for repairs.
