The New Palace of Westminster, or the Houses of Parliament-This vast and magnificent edifice contains the House of Peers and the House of Commons with the various apartments and offices connected with parliamentary business. is a highly decorated structure, in Tudor Gothic style, after designs by Sir Charles Barry, and is still in process of erection. It stands on the site of the old Houses of Parliament, destroyed by fire in 1834, on the left bank of the Thames, between the river and Westminster Abbey, and extends over an area feeding.
