

SMUGGLING AT WORK.

How Operations are carried on Over the Ice Bridge - Incounter With Smugglers.

Brockville, Out., Feb. 7. - The formation of a good solid ice bridge at this place is generally regarded as an auspictous event by a large majority of the residents on both sides of the line, as it affords excellent opportunities for the easy interchange of business relations.
