WORKMEN OPPRESSED.

What a Railroader Has to Say About Camp Lite - His Grievances Given in Detail.

The Editor, British Whig.

Sir, -- My reference to working mer oppressed is on behalf of railroad labourers in general. Nobody knows what trials and hardships these latourers have to endure. Of course everybody knows that the winters are very hard on them. They get just about one-half of what pay they ought to get. intense cold it is the excessive heat. The Japanese, on the contrary, are Some times they can get board in a pricondemned, for they are hardly fit for pigs let alone for Christians' houses. I am now speaking from experience. have been in several camps where men

have been sick. If it was not for their fellow workmen they could die, for all the camp bosses cared. They would'nt bring you up as much as a cup of water if one was dying. Would that some humanitarian would visit these camps and speak for the labourers. The majority of railroad labourers are well educated, smart and content when earning their honest livings, so never despise a poor railroader. Let me give you one or two of the rules that the laborers have to abide by on the Canadian Pacific Railroad, Sault Ste Marie Branch. The rules say all workmen will be considered as employed by the day, unless there is a special arrangement, ten hours to be considered a day's work. Before men will be entitled to receive pay they must furnish the pay master at head quarters with, first a time bill for the current month, signed by the time keeper: second, their store bill up to the late of their leaving; third, their board bill signed by their boarding boss; fourth, a receipt for their blankets and a report on their condition from the store keeper. A man may have to travel twenty or thirty miles to comply with these rules. He

is compelled to lose a day or two running around through these absurd rules. Then again men must be subject to the orders of their foremen in their camps as well as on the works. Thus as they hire the men by the day of 10 hours SOLD BY W. J why should they have to submit to their bosses after their day's work is done. If a man wants to leave he has to give fifteen days' notice. If they don't see fit to keep a man he is sent off at once.






