Examining the Masters and Mates Kingston-The Successful Candidates at Picton.

This morning the examination under the Act of the Dominion Parliament, passed at the last session, "respecting certificates to Masters and Mates of inland and coasting ships," commenced in the Court House. The Board was composed of Capt. Thos. Harbottle, Toronto, (Chairman); Capt. McElhenny, of the Marine and Fisheries Department; Capt. Taylor, Kingston; and Capt. McIlwaine of St. Catharines. The Act of the Dominion Parliament, under which the examinations are being conducted, was into force on the 1st of January. Thus no master or mate will be allowed to act as such during the coming season without a certificate. Those who acted in either of these capacities prior to the 1st of January will be granted certificate of service on producing satisfactory evidence as to competency and good conduct, and are only required to pass the

Thirty-two masters and mates were examined up to the time of our going to press for servitude, each one undergoing the color test. They all passed Mr. Nicholson, purser of the Hero,

ITS SIMPLICITY AND EFFECTIVENESS. The engine was doing her work nobly and without straining. Manager Ross, attended by several gentlemen, now started out, and added one light after another until all five were burning brightly and without any visable diminution in the power of the illumination. The effect was particularly marked upon the streets bordering on the Market Square. exhibit to night." DISTINGUISHING THE COLOURS. Merchants last evening said that colours could not be distinguished by the light, but it is said they are in error. As the light is pure white colours can be easily distinguished and matched as readily as in daylight. In Fitchburg, Mass., there are many working people and they have to do their shopping after dark. Stores which had the electric lights did so much business that those

alongside had to follow suit. An ingenious machine has been invented by which houses, factories, banks, and hotels can be lighted. The apparatus is about five inches square and weighs about 5 lbs. It can be carried easily from one apartment to another. By pressure on a button an electric current is produced, a spiral of platinum is heated to incadescence and the light is instantaneous. The lighting material tasts about two months and can be renewed. The American Electric Company have nothing to do with this inven-

The arrangements are now being perfected at the furniture factory of W. M. Drennan for the Saturday night exhibition. Mr. Drennan's engine is a 30 horse power, and capable of running the lynamo to its fullest capacitythirteen lights. This will permit of the erection of several more in addition to the five already up. Two or three will be placed on Princess Street, and if it is possible to do so four lamps will blaze a-top the dome of the City Hall, thus giving the people some idea of what the lighting of the city by towers means. Mr. Ross was asked if he purposed removing the dynamo to Belleville and there giving an exhibition of the light. He replied in the negative.
