

MODES OF LIGHTING.

the Introduction of Gas into the City The Amount Annually Consumed Electric Talk

Kingston is on the eve of another adrance in the matter of lighting and it, therefore apropos to review the vari ous steps that have been taken, par ticularly in regard to the use of gas. For years' after the settlement of this city the tallow dip and the candlesticks, held the first place in the massions of the rich and poor alike. In the lordly halls of the first families the golden. bronge, silver and brass candlesticks were to be seen, while the lowly cot tage had its iron stand. Later on coal oil was introduced and most extensively utilized though it was for a long time very expensive. It was not until 1849 that gas was manufactured and it has until now maintained its popularity with the people. It was first proposed to light the towns by gas in 1765. Their idea was scouted by some who held very superstitions ideas respecting it In 1792 William Murdock lit his own house with it in Redruth, Cornwall. Gas was introduced into London in 1810; into Paris in 1820; into New York in 1834; into Philadelphia in 1835, and into Kingston in 1849. In 1848 the Kingston merchants, with commendable enterprise.

The annual amount of gas consumed is 7,000,000 feet, and the current price of it is \$3 per 48,499.80; Robertson Bros., \$357.30; E, 1,000 feet, net. There are about 130 gas lamps, costing \$13 each per year, or after expenses are paid, 3 cents each per night. The gas sent out is 20 candle power, or some 8 candles more powerful than the Government stan lard. If the Gas Company only gave 1 12 candle light it would require about twice the quantity now used to give as good a those who received Government money light. The better the candle power the were R. Gage, \$637; W. McCartney, less the quantity burned. The Con.pauy do not view with apprehension the introduction of the electric light.
