CLEAN THE STREETS.

A police regulation, in force in Paris since 1779, requires each householder to aweep the pavement and road in front A PIRST-CLASS GENERAL SERVANT. - of his house before 7 a.m. Instead of Apply to Mrs. C. Bermingham, No. 2, Col. the work being performed by the individuals a pro rate tax was levied and four Companies entered into a contract with the city to keep the streets free from mud, dust and snow. The sweepers, both men and women, are placed under the orders of inspectors appointed by the Prefects, and at 4 o'clock each morning in winter and 3:30 in summer the sweepers assemble to answer the roll call and proceed to work. The consequence is that the streets are cleaned before the business portion of the citizens are out of bed. Very different from Toronto, where the sidewalks in winter are seldom cleared before noon and the streets await the return of warm wea-

An equally good method, in a smaller degree, is in force at London, Ont., where each Ward issues a contract for the winter and the sidewalks are kept clear with snow ploughs, two men doing the work of 100 with shovels. is proposed to make an amendment the Municipal Act making it compulsory on the corporations of cities to keep the streets, including sidewalks, in good order in all weathers, and giving them power to levy a small tax to pay for the work. If the principal streets only are kept clear then the frontage tax will only apply on those streets.

A FIRST CLASS BRUTE. A Fiend Who Beats and Cruelly Maltreats

a Defenceless Little Girl.

Pembroke, March 8.-A case of ex treme hardship, with consequent suffering, has occurred near here, a little German girl, aged about 14 years, being the victim. The child, and she is not only a child in age but in appearance, was engaged with the character of a domestic with a German farmer named Dolman, whose very name deserves to be execrated. While performing one of her household duties her employer, becoming enraged at some reply the child made to a question he asked her, brutally assaulted her, beating her with a club and kicking her with his heavy booted feet, winding up by finally casting her out of doors. The child maimed and feeble by the ill-treatment received, dragged herself to a barn a short distance from the house and there spent the night, the thermometer standing about 30 o below zero. Her inhuman master, on discovering her retreat in the morning, again attacked her, kicking and clubbing her now almost frozen body and limbs. Some people who lived in the locality, on becoming aware of her enfeebled and mutilated state, conveyed her to the General Hospital at Pembroke, where her wounds were very carefully dressed. She sented a truly pitiable spectacle. Her legs almost all the way down were one hideous wound, while her hands and feet were solidly frozen, her body simply a black mass, her head and
