LIQUOR LICENSE ACT.

Discussion in the Commons Rights of Ontario to be Settled by the Privy Council.

Ottawa, March 18 .- The time of the House to-day was occupied in discussing the Liquor License Act of 1883. Mr. Houde, in moving the House into

committee to consider a resolution to the effect that it is expedient to repeal the Act, said the decision in Hodge v. the Queen made it apparent that there had been no necessity for passing the Act, which was an infringment on provincial rights. He could not see any good in preparing a test case to go to the Supreme Court.

Mr. Langevin denied that there was any disposition on the part of the House and came down inflicting a serious gash to interfere with the rights and powers of Local Legislatures.
