If the Streams Bill is again disallowed McLaren will get nothing for the use of his fixed improvements on the Mississippi from Caldwell, or any other man, as there is no provision made for compensation in the decision of the Privy Council.

Hon. Boucher de la Bruere, of Le Courier de St. Hyacinthe, got \$7,088 for the printing of the Civil Service list, and the Government refused to certify to the account and deducted \$2,000, such being an excessive and inexcusable charge; but Sir John told the House that the whole thing had to be paid, that a bargain had been made and that it had to be fulfilled. Here we have the evidence of a corrupt act, a "job" pure and simple, and a disposition on the part of the Government to glory in it. No wonder a just and good man, in his religious meditations, has been moved to say that the worst forms of idolatry are not more despicable than the partyism of the day.

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It is Declared Not to be Antagonistic to the Salvation Army or the Church.

Last evening the Missions Hall was packed with people, the occasion being the meeting under the auspices and direction of the men who have held positions in the Salvation Army, but who, however, lately seceded because they did not approve of all that has been said and done at the barracks.

At present Kirkland fell fainting on the floor in a heap, with his legs doubled under him, creating a sensation in the Court. He was carried into the ante room and the reading of the judgment stopped for some time. It was decided to go on reading as Kirkland was unable to come into Court. The Magistrate, continuing, said the only thing now for him to decide was the point as to whether the evidence of the accomplices or informants required corroboration, and he held that it was not required in this case. He concluded by holding that there was sufficient evidence for all four defendants to stand trial on the charge of conspiracy. The defendants were then admitted to bail. On the second charge against them, of bribery, it was agreed that the charge should remain on the Magistrate's books till the other charges were disposed of.

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
