A CURATE'S INTRODUCTION. Rev. A. W. Cook Preaches at St. George's Cathedral—In the Ministry for 30 Years. A man of small stature, dark complexioned, with black whiskers and hair, enveloped in a white surplice, stood in the brass and walnut pulpit of St. George's Cathedral yesterday morning. This was Rev. A. W. Cook, the newly appointed curate. He is slow and deliberate as a speaker, but has a good voice and can be heard throughout the building. In style Mr. Cook is animated. His sermon was based on the words "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest."—Matthew XI, 28. He said that a natural characteristic of humanity was a desire for sympathy. It was a prominent trait of every man when trouble and distress comes, whether of mind, body or estate, the sufferer's pain was alleviated if he were conversant to a friend who sympathized with him. The speaker passed on to notice how desperate was the condition of mankind when there was no sympathy, a consciousness of this afflicted individuals to needs and nations to anarchy and communism. The Christian, he added, not only felt sure of the sympathy of his fellows, but he could seek for prayer the Saviour's aid and thus enable him to bear all troubles and griefs with fortitude and serenity. Christianity as an element in character, enabled the man, and as a national factor elevated the nation. As distinguished from atheism Christianity had wrought miracles for those states which had embraced it. Of which state could it be said that it had been improved by atheism. The new Curate is about 40 or 45 years of age. He has been in the ministry for 30 years, having been ordained in the cathedral of which he is now curate, shortly after his arrival from England. For twelve years he labored in the Augusta mission. Nine years ago this week he was transferred to Pictou, where he remained until called to this city. He will live on Maliland Street.

A SHOOTING AFFRAY. A Man Enters a House and Shoots the Proprietor and his Daughter. Hamilton, May 10.—This morning at 1:30 a young man named Jas. Wall, son of a city blacksmith, entered the residence of a man named Clark by a window, and after taking the family, instructed that Clark had both five minutes to live. He opened fire with a revolver three shots being discharged. One wounded Clark in the wrist, and another bullet entered the forehead of a little daughter of Clark's. After the shooting Wall made his escape, and the police have not succeeded in capturing him. The Clarks are not a very respectable family, and Wall wants to drive them from the city, because his rather strong measures. The bullets have been extracted from both the sufferers. The father will be all right, and the girl who is in the hospital, may recover.
