The missionary collections for the Algoma and North-west districts were unusually beautiful in the Anglican churches on Sunday.

The Maple Leafs are very grateful for the kind treatment they received at the Cornell House, Napanee, yesterday. They werequeoted generously used.

The Brockville people were disappointed on Saturday in not seeing the Governor-General on the str. Algerian. The dock was crowded with people.

NAPANEE'S DISPLAY.

THE TOWN CROWDED WITH PEOPLE FROM ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTY—LACROSSE MATCHES AND TRADES PROCESSION.

Beginning the Day by a Great Procession of the Various Industries—The Progression of Many Excursions—A Bicycle Tournament That Did Not Occur—The Lacrosse Matches—A Hotly Contested One Between Kingston and Napanee Clubs—General Amusement in the Agricultural Grounds—Seen by Electric Light.

Yesterday was a gala day for Napanee. From early morn until about four o'clock in the afternoon people streamed in from all parts of the country. Kingston, Belleville, Gananoque, Deseronto, Adolphstown, Tamworth, Harrowsmith and Sydneyham sent representatives. By 12 o'clock one could hardly move about on the main streets, so dense were the crowds. From every house-top and balcony floated banners of various colors and designs.

At 10 o'clock the wagons prepared for the trades' procession formed on the market, and moved off, passing through the principal streets. It was a success. The display made by the manufacturers, mechanics and merchants was very fine. The following was the order:

THE WAGGONS IN MOTION.

The various interests were thus represented:

B. Stealy—Portable engine in operation.

Brunell & Thelen—Watering engine, Herring & Son—a reaper, mower and horse rake. The mower was drawn by a fine team of black horses, owned by Gibbard & Son.

Grant—Patterson's binder.

Erta Fringle (garage manufacturer)—A wood chisel, trimming and paint shop on wheels. His men were working industriously in the various departments, Gananoque Band.

H. Milling's blacksmith shop shifted its headquarters to a platform about 200 feet long. Milling's men made horse shoes, and shod a horse while passing through the streets.

Saul & Bros. (stone masons) had a stone hoisting apparatus, and stone cutters busy cutting rough stones.

At the front of the vehicle was a structure painted stone color, intimating that they had already commenced work on the foundation of a new edifice.

L. Tisdale, (boatbuilder)—A fine skill.

Paisley Bros., (grocers)—A stock of oranges, lemons, and groceries.

Hinch, Perry & Co.—A display of beautiful carpets.

Perry & Co., (druggists)—A dandy wagon.

It represented the interior of a drug store.

Boyle & Son (tinsmiths)—Their wagon, drawn by a tandem team, contained oil stoves.

W. H. Bruton—A stock of fruit.

Moore & Son (marble cutters)—Workmen were busy cutting out marble and finishing it into tombstones.

HOTELS JAMMED FULL.

After the procession dinner was served and the hotels were packed with people with voracious appetites. It was a difficult problem for the hotel keepers to solve how they would feed the multitude, but they did the best they could. After dinner the sports took place on the agricultural grounds. An exhibition game of lacrosse occurred between the "Young Maples" and "Maple Leafs," both of Kingston, resulting in the defeat of the former. The athletic sports were heartily entered into by many persons. The crystal palace was used for telephonic purposes, and here the stewart farmers, with their sweethearts, displayed their dancing proficiencies.

ROPE WALKING AND BUN RATTING.

T. O'Brien, the champion tight rope walker of Napanee, gave an exhibition in one part of the field, while Messrs. Stevens, Hay and Jones contested in the bun eating tournament in another part. Stevens won.

The 100 yards race was a farce. Sixteen runners started but only three won prizes. The successful men were professional named Fog, Bowmanville; Thomas, of Newcastle, and S. Burdon, of Whistly, J. A. Perry, Kingston, entered and gave the professionals a good run, winning the first heat in fact, and being deprived of it through a decision of "no heat."

The tug race, on the Clarksville river, was exciting.
