supply lager beer for a smaller sum. It was decided to leave the rate of taxation unchanged, at 16 mills on the dollar. A deficit of \$8,000 will follow but the finance committee thought it was preferable to an increase in taxation which the people are ill-able to bear at the present time. It has to be borne in mind that some of the expenditure which is now being incurred is for permanent improvements, which should not be paid for out of the revenue of any one year; and so it is probable that a by-law will be submitted to the people, by the passage of which \$30,000 will be raised for municipal purposes With this money it is proposed to pay for the stone roller, the asphalt pave ment, the advances for schools, the deficits (\$4,000 from last year), and the cost of drainage, of which the city is in

The details of the budget are not now available and they will not be available until Monday, when the actions and suggestions and purposes of the com mittee will be either sanctioned or re jected by the whole council. This much is known - that the estimated revenue is \$107,318.29, the estimated expendi ture \$111,681.75, \$67,381.55 being un controllable and \$44,250.20 controllable.
