A HOT STREET FIGHT. A Collision Between Soldiers and Citizens. People Affected by the Noise. A row occurred on Ontario street at 2 o'clock this morning between soldiers and sailors. The participants fought desperately, the military using the belts, the sailors stones and everything they could lay their hands on. While the battle lasted men ran wildly about, blood spurting freely from their wounds. A soldier named Fox was paralyzed by a blow, and for a time it was thought he was dead. All the residents of the locality were awakened and kept awake by the noisy fight. At last the guards at the barracks were called out with fixed bayonets, and they quelled the disturbance. The wounded soldier, in gaining consciousness, exclaimed, "Let them kill me. The devil has been after me for some time and he will get me yet." He was badly cut up. The police arrested one Mitchell, a civilian, who appeared at the police court this morning, bearing a bad looking scar upon his right cheek. When the magistrate asked him where he got the scar he replied, "The soldiers gave it to me last night." A few days ago a trunk belonging to a man who lives at some point on the line of the Kingston & Pembroke RR, between Pathon and Sharbot Lake, was robbed of \$100, and Mitchell is suspected of being the thief. When searched this morning considerable money was found upon him. It is now thought that the row last night was caused by some one trying to rob Mitchell. He was remanded for a week. The man from whom the money was stolen will arrive to-night. He will probably identify Mitchell.

LATER INFORMATION. Driver Murphy, one of the soldiers who was engaged in the row, is laid up in the Hospital at the Battery. When taken in by the guard last night he was covered with blood. Fox is said to be the name of the soldier who was knocked insensible.

14TH MUST NOT GO. The Corps Required to Remain in Kingston and Help Along on Dominion Day. The citizens are very anxious that the trip of the 14th P. W. O. Rifles to Toronto be abandoned, and that the battalion should remain and add their energies to the efforts of the local committee for a Dominion Day celebration. The volunteers composing the companies, now that there is a prospect of a good lively time here, are said to be anything but anxious to leave, that they prefer to remain and enjoy themselves. Any way, what will be the advantage of spending a large sum of money in going to Toronto when the 14th will only be called upon to parade the streets. The Mail gave the programme a few days ago and a word was said about a review. Not only this, but that journal in quoting the battalions that would probably attend snubbed the 14th by not even mentioning it. We trust the officers will early decide to remain in the city. The Victoria Rifles of Montreal have sent their regrets to Toronto. The bandmen do not wish to go to Toronto, in fact some of the members say they will not go. An officer said to-day that some men had joined the corps believing that it would go to Toronto; if it did not go now there might be a lack of interest in drills. We don't think any citizen soldier would lose interest in a battalion whose chief desire is to make a local display.

A DEFICIT IN FUNDS. It is Preferred to an Increase of Taxation - Discussing the Civic Budget. The city finance committee met last evening and discussed the budget. The estimated receipts we gave a few days ago; the estimated expenditure was cut down some, but not so much as was to be expected. The committee requirements were generally allowed, as submitted by the respective chairmen, including some increases in connection with streets, with the fire department, and with schools. The amount asked for by the park committee was cut down. The committee contemplated the erection of a beautiful fountain, but the ornament would be an expensive one, when the water to sport so refreshingly from it would cost about \$500 or \$600 for the season. So far as the drinking necessities of the people go Bajns could supply lager beer for a smaller sum. It was decided to leave the rate of taxation unchanged, at 16 mills on the dollar. A deficit of \$8,000 will follow, but the finance committee thought it was preferable to an increase in taxation which the people are ill able to bear at the present time. It has to be borne in mind that some of the expenditure which is now being incurred is for permanent improvements, which should not be paid for out of the revenue of any one year; and so it is probable that a by-law will be submitted to the people, by the passage of which \$90,000 will be raised for municipal purposes. With this money it is proposed to pay for the stone roller, the asphalt pavement, the advances for schools, the deficits (\$4,000 from last year), and the cost of drainage, of which the city is in so much need. The details of the budget are not now available and they will not be available until Monday, when the actions and suggestions and purposes of the committee will be either sanctioned or rejected by the whole council. This much is known - that the estimated revenue is \$1,073,319.29, the estimated expenditure \$1,111,681.75, \$67,381.55 being unobtainable and \$44,350.20 controllable.

A Lacrosse Tournament. Last evening committees from the Maple Leafs, Kingston, and Young Maple lacrosse clubs met in the Win-room and considered the question of a tournament. The conclusion reached was that the project was almost impracticable for Dominion Day, on account of the many sports and exhibitions arranged for the celebration. The lacrosse games could scarcely be forced in edgewise. The unanimous vote was for a postponement to some day in August, with a preference for the civic holiday, when the full day will be devoted to this one attraction, and a dozen clubs invited and entertained. Prizes of an honorary character will be offered for competition, and at least five good matches arranged. There are now two clubs at Gananoque, one each in Brockville, Perth, Renfrew, Cornwall, Belleville, Peterboro and Napanee. The lacrosse players are ambitious to prove the ability of the national game to attract a great crowd to the city. If the celebration committee desire it, however, the city clubs will arrange a couple of games for Dominion Day. The Presidents of the three clubs have been given power in that matter to see.

The Kingston Club has been invited to meet the Napanee Club at Odessa on Dominion Day, in connection with a local celebration, but cannot leave town on that day owing to the stores being open and they being engaged in celebration movements.
