NO ONE TO BLAME.

Result of the Coroner's Enquiry Touch ing the Death of Little Peter Neill-The Verdict.

By instruction of the County Attorney Coroner Saunders yesterday beld an inquest touching the death of Peter Neill. There were few witnesses and these simply gave in substance the facts which have already been published. The father of the dead boy first testified. He said he came down stairs at an early hour on Sunday morning to light the fire, and was in the garden feeding the goslings when he heard a noise and com' motion in the house. He rushed in and met his wife with the wounded son in her arms. He did not know that there was a pistol in the house. He had neither gun nor revolver.

STATEMENT OF THE DOCTOR.

Dr. Garrett detailed how he was summoned to Neill's house and the condition in which he found the wounded boy. The wound in his face was about three quarters of an inch below the left eye, and had inverted edges, and the face for some inches around was blackened with powder. The wound was such as would be produced by the discharge of a pistol, which was shown to him. There was a protuberance at the back of the head which felt like the pistol ball, as though it had gone through the head.
