BOUND FOR PICTON.

mpressions by the Way -1 Repor ter's Mission not Always Fraught with Pleasure.

On Monday afternoon, as a WHIG representative stepped on board the steamer Hero, ca route to Picton, he thought how diversified are the duties of a pressman. One day his work in full of pleasure, the next day of misery. He is called upon on one occasion to tell of bright events, and the next day to depict the agony of death. But a few months ago he hastened to Picton to send off a friend at the altar; now to are one led to the halter. The first a sort of nuctial knot, the next a veritable slip knot. The phrase "I don't want to," finds no abiding place in the heart of a journalist when commission ed for special service.

After leaving the harbor the steamer stood westward, heading a spanking breeze. There was a lively party on board, largely made up of workingmen bound for Adolphustown. They were on a sort of holiday, and "to keep their spirits up they poured the spirits down. With mellow voices they sang and talked and orated in a most amusing way. At Stella there was trouble in getting away from the dock, two haw sers breaking as the steamer was swong around. Later the beautiful scenery of the bay dispelled gloomy thoughts, and at 8 o'clock Picton was reached and the Royal hostelry sought out.

THE GREAT TOPIC DISCUSSED was the next morning's event. ladies were as conversant with facts of the tragedy as the men. learned that there was intense sympa thy for Londer. There was a feeling that he was being made a scapegoat by someone, and after the final scene this idea grew rapidly. Many spoke em phatically of his innocency. After hear ing everything and witnessing the demeanor of the boyish fellow, we too, formed the opinion that Louder was an innocent man. Time will clear up the great mystery.

A HORRIBLY BUNGLED JOB. We have already told of how badly indeed horribly, the death sentence was carried out. Strong men quailed before the sight and left, the inhuman performance to ever after fill their minds Among those who witnessed the execution was Chief Mckinnon, whose con nection with the case has called out remarks other than complimentary. He talked boldly about the affair and severely arraigned the clergymen who had questioned the guilt of the men. He even imputed to them cranky actions. There were numerous doctors present, nome from a distance.

A SPEEDY CHANGE DEMANDED. Having witnessed the hanging of Vankoughnet we were surprised to see the same bungled moves made upon the Picton scaffold. The demand for the appointment of a competent hangman is urgent. Sheriffs will not perform the duties themselves, therefore the Government should take steps to prevent them hiring men who really don't know their business. The public who read of the barbarous way in which men are launched into eternity now-a-days cry out for more humanity in the fulfillment of the death sentence. AN AFFECTING SCENE. One of the most affecting scenes at the execution was the farewell of the men. They sided up to each other and grasped hands, then they resumed their places and met death calmly. (Toronto Glabe.) The protest and appeal of Rev. T. S. Chambers against the decision of the Presbytery of Kingston was taken up by the General Assembly on Monday. The parties were called to the bar Messrs, A. Wilson, R. Irwin, James Cleland and James Brown, joined with Dr. Gregg. Against it, Revs. H. M. Parsons, D. J. Macdonnell, B. D., and P. M. MacLeod. Rev. Dr. Gregg proceeded to state

the case. By article in Confession of taith it was clearly forbidden that man should marry deceased wife's sister and that no law of man could make such marriage proper. The parties in this case were James F. Gibson and his deceased wife's sister, Sarah Sharp, They applied to Rev. T. S. Chambers and he refused to marry them, feeling that it would be impossible for him first to marry them and then to have them deprived of their rights of membership. They applied to Rev. John Gallagher, who married them. Mr. Chambers made complaint to the Presbytery, and resigned his position as Moderator of the Session. The session accepted his resignation, and elected Mr. Gallagher to succeed him, at the same time thanking him (Mr. Gallagher) for his diligence.

On the vote being taken the motion was carried by a majority of votes and the Synod decided according ly, "That the Synod dismiss the appeal and sustain the finding of the Presbytery." He (Dr. Gregg) greatly mistook the feeling of the Assembly if they would assist such conduct as this. The appeal did not ask to have Mr. Galla-

gher suspended, but merely to express disapproval of his act. MR. MACDONNELL'S EXPLY. Rev. D. J. Macdonnell said the only question before the Synod was whether a Presbytery had a right to sist procedure. There could be no doubt that a Presbytery had a right, for a good reason, to sist procedure in any case, no matter what it involved. The only other question was whether the Presbytery had a good reason for sisting procedure. It was admitted that Mr. Gallagher had married the parties knowing that they stood in the position in question. But the other fact, which the Synod as well as the Presbytery took into account, was that for two years there had been before the church the consideration of the question, What was to be done about a particular section of the Confession of Faith with respect to marriage within certain forbidien degrees? and particularly this, that among the instructions to that committec, which was appointed last year, was to recommend what action should be taken in regard to such marriages, and they had reported that no action be taken.
