

Died at his residence in Frankford, in his 77th year of his age, on May 8th, lication after a long illness, Robert Everett Grass, who for over half a century was resident of the Township of Sydney. Deceased was the eldest son of the lat Peter Grass, of the Township of Kingston, where he was born about 1808. H was thus the grandson of Capt. Michael Grass, the leader of the United Empire Loyalists, who settled the first and oldest township in Optario, that of Kingston, first settled in 1784. Capt. Grass was an Austrian by birth, who, on com ing to America settled in the valley of the Mohawk River. In the French Intercolonial Wars he had borne arms un der the British flag. He was at the taking of Oswego by Montcalm. The English force was small, and the attacking party being superior in numbers. Colonel Mercier having been killed, the English were obliged to surrender. This was in 1756. Captain Grass was taken a prisoner to Fort Frontenac, and there he first saw which became his future home and that of his compatriots, and hence his choice of Kingston and its associate territory in 1783 as the abiding place of himself and his neighbours who sailed with him from New York in fleet of British ships. Captain Grass writes thus, dated Kingston, Dec. 7th. 1811; "Yes, seven and twenty years ago, the vestige of a human habitation could not be found in the whole extent of the Bay of Quinte. Not a settler had dared

LOUDER'S DYING WORDS. To the inhabitants of the County o Prince Edward: I thought I would write you a few lines before I die. I do not suppose anything I might say will cause you to change your minds regarding my guilt or innocence, and even if I could it would be too late to rectify any mistake and bring me back to earth again. God is my witcess that I am innocent of having had anything to do with the murder of Mr. Peter Lazier, and when I am hung for that crime the innocent is punished for the guilty. I die bearing neithir spite nor malice against anyone, and my wishes are that all my enemies may be forgiven as truly as I hope to be forgiven for all my sins. Believe me I do not die a murderer nor with a murderer's heart. If I knew who were guilty of the crime for which I am to suffer death I would make it known. I have not owned a revolver for two years past and I have not fired one off for upwards of one year. I did not have a gun in my hands for six weeks previous to my arrest, and I was not in-Mr. Gilbert Jones' nor even on his premises in my life to my knowledge These are my last and dying words. (Signed).

GROBGE LOUDER. Picton, June 9th, 1884. THE LAST TO HIS MOTHER. Dear kind and loving mother: These are my last dying words. I never knew that fatal shot was fired, nor that man was killed, nor about the murder, nor my boots never made the tracks : but the jury says I must die to pay some man's penalty. I am ready to die but I die for something I never did. You want me to confess, but I never will to a crime I am not guilty of. I never was in Gilbert Jones' house in fifteen years, nor I pever was at the door in four years. never saw Jones get any money at the station, but I must say it is like all the stories that are told about me. They won't let me alone and let me die in peace. They wou't let my poor old father rest in the grave. You know father never had to pay one dollar for any wrong I ever did, but I forgive all those that swore false against me. I forgive all my enemies. I want them to forgive me. With all the reports no man can say I ever done them any wrong, nor took anything from them. But my shoulders have borne many wrongs that I never flid. Mrs. Jones swore at the examination the men were larger men than we are, and at the trial we looked just like the men. She said the man that fired the shot had on a grey suit of tweed. I had on my dark clothes that day. They say I fired the shot, but thank God I was not there to fire any shot, so I cannot confess to that crime; nor I never will. If they will let me die in peace I have made my

While a net lisherman willingly pays the amount of hicease the Government yearly domands, these high-toned New Yorkers come across the line and bring their oarsmen with them, and the greater number even bring their provisions for tear they would leave one dol. lar in Canada. And after all they presume to ask our government to make a move toward protecting the inland waters and widen the prohibitory law of net fishing, not satisfactory with those long range of waters on the Canadian side of the River St. Lawrence.
