COLLEGE QUESTION AGAIN. Dr. Grant, Principal of Queen's College, shines best in debate, especially when it tends to warm the blood and heat the spirit. The readers of the Witto already know that the trustees of our university, in their report to the general assembly, stated that an increase in the allowance from the common college fund to this institution was necessary in order to avoid a deficit next year. The suggestion was hotly opposed by Princi pal Cavan, who objected to the arrangement of proportions entered into some years ago being disturbed, and intimated that if this arrangement were not satis

factory the colleges should be left to appeal to their several constituencies. Now the head of Knox College had no occasion to speak so curtly and offen sively, and when he did so he stirred up the friends of Queen's in an unexpected way. They gave Dr. Cavan and the members of the assembly to understand that Queen's was only asking for what was equitable, that sources of revenue to the theological department which the college had some years ago were now lost, and that while they were auxious for peace and harmony they did want it at any cost. Motion after motion had been suggested and withdrawn, and it looked as it nothing would be done. when Dr. Grant came to the front and said that "if he were to be told that he was in a house which would not consi der a simple matter ot justice either this year or next then his interest in the house was at an end. They had always felt they could appeal to the Assembly for anything they wanted, and because of his deep respect for that house he could not sit in such a posi-

they would be soon forthcoming, but because of his deep respect for that court of which he was an unworthy member, he asked for the appointment of a committee on this subject. They could not go away feeling trampled upon; they could not go away feeling that they had not had justice. This was a veritable bombsbell in the assembly, and it led to action, two motions being carried-one to have the congregation enjoined to give more liberally to the college funds, and one to

TILDEN GIVES REASONS. Tilden's letter to the Democrats of the United States contains some noble and patriotic sentiments. He says he has devoted as much thought and effort to the duty of influencing aright the action of the Governmental institutions of the country as he could, he never sought office, and he only accepted it for a brief period, when occasion demanded the sacrifice of private preferences to the public welfare. He thus proceeds: "I undertook the state administration of New York because it was supposed that in that way only could the executive power be arrayed on the side of the reforms to which as a private citizen, had given three years of my life. I accepted the nomination for the presidency is 1876 because of the general conviction that my candidacy would best present the issue of reform which the Democratic majority of the people de sired to have worked out in the federal government as it had been in that of the state of New York. I believed I had strength enough then to renovate the administration of the government of the United States and at the close of my term to hand over the great trust to a successor faithful to the same policy. The canvass and administration which it is desired I should undertake would embrace a period of nearly five years. Nor can I admit any illusion as to their burdens. The considerations which influenced my action in 1880 have become imperative. I ought not to assume a task which I have not the physical strength to carry through. To reform the administration of the federal government, to realize my own ideal and

and fulfill the just expectations of the people would indeed warrant, as they alone could compensate, the sacrifices which the undertaking would involve. But in my condition of advancing years and declining strength I feel no assurance of my ability to accomplish these objects. I am, therefore, constrained to say definitely that I cannot now assame the labors of the administration or of a canvass. I am consoled by the reflection that neither the Democratic party or the Republic, for whose future that party is the best guarantee, is now, or ever can be, dependent upon any one man for their successful progress in the path of noble destiny. Having given to their welfare whatever of health and strength I possessed, or could borrow from the future, and having reached the term of my capacity for such labors as their welfare now demands, I but sub mit to the will of God in deeming my

public career forever closed." Tilden has candidly and eloquently stated his case. He is in better health now that he was in 1890, when he declined to be the Democratic standard bearer, but he is far from well and unable to undertake the toil and anxieties of a rampaign. INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

The Scheme Not Yet Perfect -sent Back to a Committee-Boards Hanging Fire.

Mr. Horsey, chairman of the committee on school management, at the meetng of board of education last evening rose to report the result of their deliberations in regard to the industrial school, but before doing so he said that a communication had been piaced in his hands from Mr. Machar, appouncing that the conclusions of the committee would not be acceptable to the Midland District Society. It was, therefore, questionable whether he ought to present the report. The board decided that he should, and the secretary strog. House. glol through four pages of foolscap, the larger portion of the writing upon which was in legal pl.raseology. It set forth that the Midland District Society had an income of about \$900 per annum, which it was purposed to lonate towards the establishment and maintain ence of au industrial school; that the public school board were asked to delegate to the said society certain powers specified in the special act passed at the last meeting of the legislature ; that the society should be entitled to the grant from the government under the act, and be assisted by the board to the extent of appointing a teacher or teachers of conmon school subjects; that the board con sented to the delegation of the powers asked for conditionally

That the society, with resources other than those desired from municipal taxation, shall provide the requisites and meet the expenses of the industrial school, excepting the salary of the teacher or teachers to be appointed by the public school board; that the society shall be entitled to the legislative grant, but that it shall not make the city responsible for any of its liabilities.

That the delegation of special powers to the society shall not make the public school board liable for the maintenance of the industrial school, or for the levy tion. Therefore, not for the dollars, for and collection of taxes to meet its costs

That the society shall take its new departure by July of next year. That, excepting the teachers' salaries, the society shall pay all the expenses of the experiment.

That the board shall be indemnified against hability which may be incurred though the exercise of the powers delegated to the society. That an agreement between the board and the Society, to the above effect, shall

be entered into, and that the chairman and secretary shall be empowered to That if the society accept the delegated powers and afterwards fail to observe the conditions accompanying them

they shall be at an end and have no ef-

MR. MACHAR'S LAST STATEMENT. Mr. Horsey now submitted the letter which he had received from Mr. Machar. It said that the writer had explained the report of the committee and that the majority of the members of the society said they could not establish the ludustrial School according to the conditions accompanying the delegation of powers from the board. A meeting of the society would be held the next day (today) and he desired to know if the board were agreeable to carrying out the original arrangement provided the funds of the society could be transferred and an ndustrial school established by the

Mr. Horsey moved the adoption of the Mr. Irving moved that the report be

referred back to the committee on school management for further donsideration. Negotiations more acceptable to both boards might be accepted

The chairman doubted this. MR. HORSEY IN REASONING HUMOUR. Mr. Horsey said that when the board undertook the consideration of the industrial school it was supposed that the experiment would not cost more than the District Midland Society was able to meet. He had Mr. Agnew to look into the Act and he found that the city was liable to be called upon for \$1 per week for every pupil sent to the school and calculating the committals at 50 in the year here would be a tax of \$2,600. to be called upon for \$1 per head per week, but there might be a difficulty in collecting these dues. If the former were not limited, and the number of pupils in the industrial school should increase to 100-and the Police Magistrate and the County Judge had all to say about that-the tax per annum on the city would be \$5,000, and it was not right to place the creation of such a liability in the hands of a body which was not elective. Now it was again proposed to transfer the funds of the society to the board and have the latter establish the school. In any case he thought the experiment would be expensive, and the committee was not disposed to take new action in regard to it. Each pupil would

cost about \$75. The chairman said the society did not desire to go on with the scheme because they saw that they could not carry on the work with the money at their disposal. The solicitor advised the board that it would be unwise to hand over such large powers to a body who were not in any way responsible to the citi-

A FAVOURABLE LINE OF THOUGHT. Mr. Polson said the industrial school was promoted by Dr. Wilson, who was of the opinion that a considerable number of pupils were not acting right in the schools, that they were a constant terror, that they were utterly beyond the control of the teachers and parents, and that they could be corrected in an institution in which they were not only educated but disciplined. Industrial schools were indispensible in large cities where there was a large percentage of very bad boys. He did not think there would be 50 boys committed in Kingston. He believed that a school of the kind could be established on a limited scale, that it would be a success, and that this would be apparent if the experiment were tried. He thought every effort should be made to reach an arrangement

between the two boards. REGRETTING THAT DOYS WERE BAD. Mr. Irving regretted that there was occasion for the establishment of an industrial school. He would not recomwould rather the schools should run the risk of contaminating the good or of the good reforming the bad. The city was loaded with enough expenses.
