

The Railway System Which the Gardin Have Introduced into Their Store.

R. & J. Gardiner have just improved their already handsome establishment. They have introduced the Lamson Cash Railway System, by which noisy money changing is dispensed with, and little wooden balls, containing the cash, roll peoples heads rounding curves, turning switches until they drop into baskets over the clerks' head. A PANICKY MARKET.

Big Drop in Federal and a Decline in All the Securities - Resignation of Mr. Strathy.

Montreal, June 27 .- Yesterday's Star said the stock market of that day was of a most penicky nature. Securities fell all round, and all endeavors to peg the market appeared futile. There does not appear to have been any legitimate reason for such a terrible deprecation, and the very men who have been bears for months, and who had been in the most unmerciful manner selling Federal "short," state that they believe the bank is perfectly sound and will weather the storm without any difficulty. The whole trouble appears to to be that there is too much stock carried on speculation and margins running out, and brokers have had to sacrifice other securities. Federal, a few months ago selling at 160, at the beginning of this month at 120 and Tuesday at 109, sold to-day at 881. Other stocks followed suit, and Bank of Montreal fell from 181 vesterday to 1784 to-day; Commerce from 1154 to 109; Merchants from 106 to 102; Richelieu from 55 to 50, and tias from 176 to 173.

A RUMORED RESIGNATION.

Mr. Strathy, manager of the Federal bank, has resigned, and Mr. W. J. The only explanations offered are : first, that the stock market generally is going to smash, as evidenced by the decline of Bank of Montreat smoothly away on tracks above the 10 points since Friday, and secondly, that there is distrust of the manager. Mr. Strathy, of the Federal, who is speculative and is believed to have been bitten lately. The President Mr. Nordheimer, returned to Toronto vesterday from Montreal quite suddenly. It was not a question now of pursuing a colonial policy, by subvention and protection, nor of entering upon the Utopian scheme of founding new provinces, but Germany could not withhold protection from Germans abroad when it was demanded. The refusal to grant such protection would be equivalent to cond war with France were generally expected, and that inclination therefore was excited everywhere. Nevertheless the members must bear witness that he did not allow it to come to pass. The government of France, since 1870, had maintained confidence in Germany. Germany's relations with France were as confidential and amicable as with any other country. There existed complete trust in reciprocal treatment and in the mutual honor of both.

ENGLISH POLITICAL EXCITEMENT.

Stirring Effect of an Announcement Regard ing the Sovereignty of the River Congo. London, June 27 .- La Commons last night, the Under Foreign Secretary stated that the Government had no intention of ratifiying the proposed treaty with Portugal regarding the Congo. That portion of the treaty, however, which relates to the creation of the river commission will be retained and the commission made international. The statement caused considerable excitement, as the treaty referred to substantially re cognize the Portuguese Sovereignty on Congo. Conservatives declare the Gov ernment was scared into the abandonment of the treaty by Bismarck. The Portuguese politicians are furious over the appouncement.

CHINESE AGAINST F RENCH

Fighting Continues for Fully Two Days - A Large Number Killed and Wounded. Paris, June 27 .- There has been fightng near Langson. It continued for two days. Ten Frenchmen were killed and 33 wonnded. Two steamers have gone for the wounded. General Negrier has joined the French columns near Bak le and is awaiting orders. The Chinese Generals, Vuon Giy and No Ny, have 10, 000 regulars between Bak-le and Lang-

PURSUING THE LIQUOR DEALERS. Philadelphia, June 27.-700 liquor dealers have been summoned to court to show cause why their licenses should not be forfested because of a violation of the old law governing the sale of liquors.

MAKING A CONCESSION. Belfast, June 27.-The Pan Presbyterian Council has voted to admit the Cumberland Church in the Council.

REBELS GETTING STRONGER. Cairo, June 27.—The rebels are mass creased firing at Suakim last evening.

London, June 27. - The tranchise bill passed the first reading of the House of Lords to-day.
