

FLEMING GIVES A SNUB

In his new publication, "Old to New Westminster," Mr. Chancellor Fleming, of Queen's University, mildly castigates the officers of the British Science Association for their failure to aid him having the standard time discussed endorsed. There is no ground on which to dispute Mr. Fleming's claim to the origination of the idea. Twenty years ago, when engaged as an engineer, he felt that, in connection with the rail ways in Canada, extending over several degrees of longitude, difficulties would arise in the computation of time. He deeply studied the problem, and became more than ever impressed with the im portance of the question, not to Canada, not to the continent only, but to the world. In 1878, while in London, he gave notice of his intention to bring the matter before the British Association, in Dublin, in the following August. He attended the meeting, but did not get an opportunity to read the paper he had prepared. "And now," writes Mr Fleming, "I will take upon myself to remind the officers of the British Association that since that date the subject has not been considered beneath the notice of many scientific societies or both sides of the Atlantic, that it has been earnestly discussed at international congresses in Venice and Rome, that it has led to the House of Representatives and the Senate of the United States passing a joint resolution, requesting the President to invite the atquestion." He adds, somewhat sarcastically and with a good deal of sting;
