"Evangeline," the Property of Bishop Sullivan - A Pretty Craft.

This morning the steam yacht Evan-

geline (formerly the Zenobia) the property of Dr. Sullivan, Bishop of Algorea. obtained at Glasgow, arrived in port and tied up at Gunn's wharf, Alexander Dennison, of Montreal, accompanies the yacht to Toronto. She has a cutaway stern and a pretty gilded bow She is 59 ft. keel and 11 ft. beam. She is registered as eighteen tons and draws 2ft. 6 in. of water: She is schooner rigged. The vessel which is of teak, was built at Cowes, in the Isle of Wight in 1870, and the engines, of 15 nominal horse power, are by G.E. Ellis &Co., Birmingham. Mr. Cameron, the engineer. who came out with the yacht, and who has been engaged to take charge of her stated that the average speed of the vacht under steam is ten knots, and in smooth water she could do even better. The passenger accommodation is aft and occupies about one half of the yessel. day. The cabin is a very cosy apartment for such a small craft, and has day accommodation for some twenty persons. At night the lonnges down the side may be converted into berths, affording comfortable accommodation for two, while berths for another couple are furnished in a private state room forward of the cabin. The fittings also include lava tories, etc. The interior of the cabin is finished in bird's eye maple, a pretty decoration being an unique little tile fireplace surmounted with a mirror. The lounges and chairs, and the folding table which occupies the middle of the cabin, are of mahoganv. A vory comfortable forecastle is provided for the accommodation of the crew, and every available corner in the vessel is utilized for lockers. Reduction not Extended to Peas.

Supposed Blunder by the Government Montreal, July 15 .- Some dissatisfaction is expressed at the action of the Government in omitting to include peas in the list of grain subject to a reduction in passing through the St. Lawrence and Welland canals. So far this season only four or five cargoes of peas have reached the city, and the canal collections in each instance exacted dues at the old rate, claiming that they had not received orders to the contrary from headquarters. The forwarders, too, are charging on the same grain at the old rate, but express their willingness to fall into line, provided the Government takes some action. A considerable portion of the peas shipped to Europe comes from Outario, and a leading grain man to-day remarked to the writer that unless the rate was reduced to that on other grain it would be dispatched rea New York as the latter route was cheaper and most practicable. The railways are carrying comparatively little grain at present, the transportation companies securing the bulk of the carrying trade.


