

Salvation Army Orders.

The "Salvation Soldier's Guide Book" brings down some very severe laws for the guidance of the army members. Ninety deaths took place in March; 12,773 in April. In May the mortality fell to about 800, but in the latter part of June again increased. In July 2,573 deaths from cholers were registered, and about 1,000 in August, after which the death rate diminished greatly, By this opidemic 18,492 persons perished in Paris alone from March to September.
