HON. EDWARD BLAKE.

A great many to day welcomed to the city Hon. Edward Blake, leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, and, as Thompson Cooper, F.S.A., biographer, says, foremost among the public men of the dominion, "Leing alike distinguished for his ability and his high character." Mr. Blake commenced his political career in 1867. He then entered the Local Legislature and led his party to power. He succeeded Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald in the Premership in 1871, held office until 1874. and in that time developed various schemes, having for their object the advancement of provincial interests. He early put the finances upon a solid footing and inaugurated the policy of public aid to railways, which encouraged the construction of many local lines and from the fund created by which over \$400,000 was voted to the Kingston & Pembroke RR. It was certainly not anticipated, however, by him that the railways assisted by the local legislature should pass under the protection and control of great monopolies or British American Hotel, in the City of King of the Dominion Parliament, and the more recent legislation of the latter upon the railway question is regarded with

disfavour by every true provincialist. Mr. Blake was the first to check the federal authorities in their wrong-doing anent the boundary of Ontario. Soon after taking office as premier of the province he found that the dominion arbitrator was instructed to fix or find, not the true or conventional line, but a line suggested by his employers. Mr. Blake called for the papers under which the commissioners were supposed to act, and seeing the biased and improper nature of their contents stopped for the time being all further proceedings

FILING AN ANSWER. Paper which is being Sued by Blaine for

Libel Makes Another Statement.
