Export Cattle Firmer Sheep Dull and Unchanged Offering Butcher's Store.

(Montreal Gazette) The exports of cattle last week were large, being 2,602 head, against 1,491 for the previous week, 320 for the same week in 1883, 2,147 in 1882, and 970 in 1881. The total exports this season to date are ahead of last year for the first time, and are thus the largest in the Sept. 19. history of the trade. The number of cattle exported to date is 48,146 head, an increase of 1,453 head over 1882, of 6.995 over 1882, and of 5.554 over 1881. The exports of sheep last week were 1;643 head, against 1,622 during tle previous week, 1,079 during the same week in 1883, 1,564 in 1882, and 1,108 in 1881. The total shipments to date continue to keep away behind former years, being 41,315 head, a decrease of 36,620 head from 1883, of 23,164 from 1882, and of 12,017 from 1881.
