TWO WEEKS IN A DUNGEON.

Prison Authorities Can't Manage a Very Obstinate Chinaman.

Philadelphia, Oct. 1.-Yung Lung, the Chinaman who was sent to the house of correction about three weeks ago, has been discharged. When he first entered the institution he was given a cell the same as other inmates, and next morning was put to work in the kitchen. He worked for about half an hour and then stopped, and all the persuasions and threatenings did not affect him. He positively refused to work any more. and the officers found it necessary to the latter place for nearly two weeks and still refused to go to work, but on Monday last his defiant spirit gave way and he was at once put to work in the quarry. He worked there until a day or two ago, when he was discharged, not because his time was out but because he was "no earthly use" at the institution. He is terribly emsciated from his long confinement in the dungeon and looks as though he would not live long.
