Seriously speaking the svggestion should have emanated from some one who meant what he said, and who was in a position to practically illustrate the genuineness of his sentiments. If the idea originated from a very weak source, financially, as it seems to have done, the chair will [not be estabnew and hitherto unknown sower.

JUDICIAL APPOINTMENTS. Bustander is particularly severe upon Sir John Macdonald in regard to his late judicial appointments. There can

be nothing more pointed than this lan-

"Sir John Macdonald had voluntarily or unvoluntarily used every other sort of patronage without exception for party objects. To satisfy the evil claims of his adherents he had not shrunk from bestowing his patronage so as to reduce a branch of the legislature to impotence and degradation. But there was one bright spot in his otherwise dark record. He had spared the judiciary, and had seemed to take pride in being able to say that, though he was compelled to yield to the importunities of faction in all other departments, his care in the appointment of judges proved that regard for the interest and the honor of the country was still the ruling principle in his own heart. He had even won the applause of all good citizens by promoting to the bench an eminent law yer of the opposite party. But now seems the judiciary has gone with the Senate and every other part of the Minister's trust into the common fund of

We have nothing to say in defence of the appointments, but it may be remarked of the bench itself that its emoluments are not now such as to induce good lawyers to abandon their practice and accept elevation to it. The men who, in late years, brought honor and great ability to the judiciary, had, it is said already placed themselves in an easy position. They were prepared to happily devote themselves to the discharge of their new and important duties. When Judge O'Connor was appointed it is doubtful if there was a man of greater calibre agreeable, and by him the place and its \$5,000 a year were very highly appreciated.



He attended Bloomington University. but was never graduated, and subse quently read law at Corydon, in the office of Judge Porter, who is still living. In 1860 he was elected to the State Le gislature, became Lieut. Col. of the 38th Regiment, and soon afterwards Colone of the 53rd, and in the stege of Vicksburg, served as a Brigadier General. In the fighting before Atlanta he was seri onsly wounded in the left leg and compelled to quit the service, and though the leg was not amputated, he still has to walk with a cane and frequently suffers intense pain from the fracture. Subsequently, as military commander of the Natchez District, Gresham put down the cotton thieves and to the local agent, Mr. Hughes. The was, instrumental in sending many of the termination of his military career Mr. Gresham resumed his law practice in New Albany, and in 1866 ran against the late Speaker Kerr for Congress, his popularity enabling him to reduce his opponent's majority. General Grant, when President, wished to make him Secretary of the Interior, but that being impracticable, he named him as Collector of New Orleans. The appointment was declined. Subsequently he was appointed to succeed the late Judge Mc-Donald as United States District Judge for this district. But Judge Gresham's tastes impelled him to a political career and, in 1880, he was an unsuccessful candidate for the United States Senate. When he received telegraphic notice of his appointment to the office of Postmaster General he was holding court at Evansville. In the interim the duties of the office devolved upon the First Assistant Postmaster Frank Hatton. Mr. Gresham's political sympathies are with the Republican party, but he has not been conspicuous in political affairs. His administration as Postmaster-General was satisfactory, and his appointment as Secretary of the Ireasury is generally approved. Secretary Gresham is six feet high, of dark complexion, black eves and hair, and beard originally black but now streaked with gray. During his whole career his character has been

TALKING THE SCOTT ACT.

Convention to be Held in Kingston, and Voting Upon It Fully Discussed.
