As yet we have seen no attempt at an explanation, such less a defense of Sir John Macdonald's extraordinary conduct with regard to the two constituents which elected him nearly a year ago. There can be no possible excuse for his conduct. It is not necessary even from a party point of view, for the issue of one seat could not in the least embarrass a Government with so large a majority. Virtuous though may seem his standpoints, it is certainly unfair to his friends for a whole session a constituency so important as Carleton or Lennox.

ROSS'S EXTRADITION

It is estimated that efforts are to be made to extradite O'Donnell Ross, the most notorious criminal master to whom America has given shelter. He ought to be taken to England and called to account for what he confesses to have done, but legal technicalities may save him from the punishment which no one having the welfare of Ireland at heart would be sorry to see imposed upon him. He has been the greatest ingrate of the age. It was an unknown act to ever let him loose from prison. His freedom he has not fairly surrendered on the contrary from the day he left the old land for the old land's god and came to America, he has been conspiring against the Government, doing what he can to continue disturbance in it.

It is said he cannot be extradited because only an accessory to a crime before the act, the conviction of the New York thief. If this be good law Ross can afford to be defiant, and can still be manager of the villainous schemes some of which have been miscarried, some been checked by the arms of the now commanding authority England by the use of dynamics. Ross claimed to have connection with the attempt to destroy Westminster, but it was thought he was assuming credit where none was due to him, in order to win fresh popularity and impress the people to increase their contributions to the skirmishing fund. The evidence advanced at the trial of the conspirators now proves that Ross was one of the instigators of that movement, the designer of other schemes of a malicious yet useless character, because no man, no patriot at least, can see the sense of destroying property, and with it innocent lives when by such a little can be accomplished in the direction intended.

It is surprising that those having some presence to shrewdness should become the willing tools of a political renegade and vagabond; that no Welch declares they should make make the meaning of which they do not comprehend; that they should undertake a service of the most diabolical kind; that they should walk, and were right into the jaws of the British lion. Dr. Gallagher and his associates will, in all probability, be imprisoned for life while Ross studies and says the war will go on through the long full. There may be no relief from the plottings which are originated in New York until Ross finds himself again in a straight jacket and the government of the United States say to those of his kind: "America is a free country, and those who become citizens must quit like men, must be of powerful mind and action, above all mind do nothing which will affect the unity existing between this nation and Great Britain."
