OUR LOCAL FISHERIES

REPORTS of the Department of Marine - Quantity of Fish Caught in This Vicinity.

SUPPLEMENT No. 2 to the 15th annual report of the Department of Marine and Fisheries has come to hand.

FROM the report we learn some facts of a local as well as general interest.

THE officers' salaries and disbursements in connection with fish handling, amount to \$21,223.82; that the collections during the fiscal year for licenses, fines and forfeitures, reached \$23,657.41.

THAT there were 4,850 fishermen named, and that the fisheries staff numbered 64. The following are the inspectors employed in this vicinity and their salaries:

John Cox, Howe Island, \$30; Peter Kud, Howe Island and the southern part of the county, comprising the townships of Scarborough, Palsburg and Kingston, \$300.

JAMES REDMOND, County of Prince Edward, \$300; W. H. Johnston, Charlton Lake, Gananoque Lake and River, \$300.

JAMES GREEN, Gananoque River, \$40; JOHN A. CUMMINS, that part of the county north of Langhorne; Lake Edward, \$300.

A. D. SILL, Lake Shore and inland waters, County of Lennox & Addington, including Amherst Island, \$150.

VALUABLE STATISTICAL INFORMATION. Then comes the following statistical information, carefully collected and compiled, about the number and value of certain boats, nets, etc.

PIGION ISLAND - Two boats, \$120; 6 men; 12 gill-nets, 750 rods, valued at \$200.

OF the catch 600 lbs. were white fish, 20,000 lbs. trout, 1,000 lbs. bass, and 1,200 lbs. pickerel, value \$1,780.00.

ROCKY BAY - Two boats, \$300; 4 men; 35 gill-nets, and 523 rods, worth \$152.

THE catch embraced 3,200 lbs. bass, 4,400 lbs. pickerel and 230 lbs. sturgeon, valued at \$528.

BIG SANDY BAY - Three boats, \$80; 6 men; 12 hoop-nets, each 30 rods, coarse fish, value \$224.

BATHING BAY - One boat, \$40; 2 men; 8 hoop-nets, worth \$128; catch, 40 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$192.

HOWE ISLAND - Two boats, \$20; 2 men; 100 rods worth \$30; five hoop-nets worth \$80; catch 300 lbs. pickerel and 40 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$240.

PALSBURG - Three boats, \$40; 3 men; 12 hoop-nets, worth \$200; catch 20 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$126.

THOUSAND ISLANDS - Two boats, \$40; 4 men; 16 gill-nets, 140 rods, catch 2,300 lbs. bass, 4,200 lbs. pickerel, and 2,500 lbs. sturgeon, valued at \$2,520.

GANANOQUE - Three boats, \$70; 3 men; 40 rods worth \$120; catch 5,800 lbs. pickerel and 35 lbs. sturgeon, valued at \$3,520.

INLAND WATERS - Catch 500 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$1,000.

THE totals are: Eighteen boats, \$535; 30 men; 124 gill-nets, 1,753 rods, worth \$626; 27 hoop-nets, \$600; catch 600 lbs. white fish, 30,000 lbs. trout, 6,400 lbs. bass, 15,400 lbs. pickerel, 9,600 lbs. sturgeon, 20 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$5,145.

THE following are the facts applying to what is known as the Frontenac Division.

MICHILINGHOOT - Nine boats, \$74; 18 men; 18 gill-nets, 208 rods, worth \$120; catch 600 lbs. white fish, 900 lbs. trout and 85 lbs. herring, valued at \$530.

ROULEAU - Fourteen boats, \$114; 28 men; 14 gill-nets, 277 rods, worth \$130; 3 hoop-nets, \$94; catch, 1,400 lbs. trout and 13 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$427.

PORTLAND - Two boats, \$17; 4 men; 2 gill-nets and 40 rods, worth \$22; catch, 30 lbs. herring, 300 lbs. pickerel, valued at \$43.

PULMERSTON - Five boats, \$38; 10 men; 7 gill-nets, 140 rods, \$98; catch, 2,300 lbs. trout, 10 lbs. herring, value \$771.

LANGHORNE - Twenty-three boats, \$207; 45 men; 28 gill-nets, 389 rods, \$207; 25 hoop-nets, 4,300 lbs. trout, 121 lbs. herring, valued at \$1,147.

THE totals are: 38 boats, \$420; 96 men; 64 gill-nets, and 1,533 rods, valued at \$688; 4 hoop-nets, worth \$94; catch, 600 lbs. white fish; 9,600 lbs. trout; 307 lbs. herring; 30,000 lbs. pickerel and 13 lbs. coarse fish, valued at \$4,620.

MR. SILL, overseer in Lennox and Addington, states that the catch in his district in 1910 was worth \$2,100; in 1910, \$4,200; in 1911, \$4,200; in 1912, \$2,680.72.

THE Overseer of the Wolfe Island and Kingston divisions report the value of the fish catch in 1910 as \$2,000; in 1910, \$4,270; in 1911, \$4,052; in 1912, \$3,145.

SOME weeks ago we mentioned the fact that the wife of James Butler, sprint runner, had been very anxious to ascertain his whereabouts.

THE circumstance was vividly impressed upon the reporter's mind as the young woman had been seen in town and seemed to be much depressed.

BUTLER had left her at a citizen's to be held and for four weeks did not indicate where he was, neither did he send her the money to meet her requirements.

PREVIOUS to the lodgment of her complaint against his neglect she went to Pictou, hoping to see him there, but she was disappointed, and through the kindness of the Captain of a bay steamer brought back to the city.

THEN she laid her sorrows before the Chief of Police and that official promised to look after her interests. No trace, however, was found of the coloured hero. A week ago Mrs. Butler decided to go West in search of him.

SHE walked to the station, carrying her little parcel of goods, and though possessed of no money secured a passage to Woodstock where a strict escort occurred.

THE coloured sprinter, James Butler, who has been in Woodstock off and on all Spring, brought a woman home with him last week whom he said was his wife.

ON Saturday evening last, however, they arrived here another woman who also claimed to be his wife, and clinched her assertion by showing her marriage certificate together with telegrams from him. When the "husdrover" father of James, and where he and his so-called wife were staying, there was a scattering, the result being that woman No. 1 had to vacate the premises in favour of No. 2.

MARRIED IN PRISON. Butler married the woman whom he deserted here in the Kingston Penitentiary. The two were inmates of the institution, and during their imprisonment they were drawn towards each other by love and so far conducted their courtship as to arrange for a marriage, which was consummated by Rev. C. K. Cartwright. The union promises to be for the best. The couple seemed to have a strong and genuine affection for one another, and their wedding was accepted as the beginning of a new, improved and useful era in their lives.

IN July, 1888, Butler and one Gilbert attempted to escape. They had got away from the Deputy Warden, but were re-captured. Of course when their terms of imprisonment were about expired they were brought before the County Judge and tried for their last offence. Butler and his chum would have got an additional six months but for the intervention of the Warden; as it was they got off with 15 days. Butler does not seem to have merited this leniency.
