The citizens of Kingston would be very indifferent indeed were they not to appreciate highly the visit to-day of His Excellency the Governor General and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, especially as they are accompanied by another member of the royal family, whose welcome will be equally warm, and whose visit has its greatest interest in its freshness. The cordial address of the Mayor and corporation to-day is representative of the warm feeling entertained throughout the city. of mingled respect and admiration-respect for a Governor who has endeavoured to discharge his duties, public and social, impartially, thoroughly and affably; and admiration for a Princess whose laudable examples and genuine interest in Canada and its artistic and benevolent matitutions, as well as in the success of her husband's high office. virtually command it.

The Marquis assumed the gubernatorial chair at a juncture when many an older head might have hesitated Earl Dufferin's able administration and polished address had surrounded the office with an color rarely attained. But the westom of his successor and ability of his public addresses have so siletained it that he retires with equal credit. The Princess had a still mere trying position to uphold. The translations from the surroundings of a court circle to the comparative seclusion of a Canadian home was a change so great that it involved no ordinary sacrifice, especially as she had few public duties. like her husband's, to occupy her attention.
